## U. S. TEACHERS UNPAID IN JAPAN

TOKYO (AP)—Occupation personnel and dependents may receive free lessons in oral English in Japanese schools, but must get military government approval to address parent-teacher associations or other Japanese educational organizations, the military government has decided.

Payment of any kind for teaching is forbidden, and it is recommended that no gifts be accepted, "even of small value."

The procedure to be followed by cotton farmers in obtaining cotton classification and market news services in 1949 under the Smith-Doxey Act will be the same as in 1948, the U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced.

ted and said: "Just think the State is now spending one million dollars a month—every month!"

Those dear, dead days.

Now we are approaching that magic figure one billion dollars. In fact, if the people vote the \$25,000,000 for school building and the \$200,000,000 for road, the General Assembly which Governor Scott kicked and lambasted as being "economy-minded" will have paved the way for spending \$652,000,000. It actually spent \$427,000,000.

Scott still has at least one more Legislature—probably two more—coming to him and thus it should be relatively easy for his administration to reach the one-billion-dollar figure. He only has \$340,000,000 to go.

## Haywood Wheat Raisers Asked For Crop Data

All Haywood County farmers who grew wheat in 1947, 1948, or 1949 or had allotment in 1942 have been asked to contact the County AAA office in the Court House by May 10.

The information the wheat growers give may be used to determine the wheat allotment for the individual farm.

The request was made in a letter sent recently to farmers. It was signed by Chairman A. W. Ferguson, Vice-Chairman J. B. Higgs, and C. R. Limer, regular member of the Haywood AAA Committee.

"We feel that it will be to your advantage to give us this information as accurately as possible," the letter also said, "since it may have some effect in the future on the price support program for tobacco and other crops."

## Notes

Several members of the Legislature, during their hands into empty pockets on the day of adjournment, vowed they would not be candidates for the General Assembly next time.

Buren Jurney of Stateville is scheduled for a term when his term on the N. C. Public Commission expires May 1. Rep. John Unstead and the school forces had not fought a fight to spend that reserve fund of \$20,000,000 right now for further school teacher raises. They would have gotten most of it eventually anyhow, for it was set up to prevent declines in salaries of teachers and other State employees in hard times.
