Master Sergeant Edward H. Gidley, retired, organist, and Miss Mavis Dean of Ithica, N. Y., soloist, presented a program of wedding music. Miss Dean sang, "Panis Angelicus," and Gounod's "Ave Maria." The traditional marches were played as processional and recessional.
