## Theological Seminary President Terms Sunday Schools World's Vital Institutions

Ellis Fuller, president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., commented recently on the importance of the family as a whole attending Sunday School regularly. In this connection, he made the following statement:

With every passing year my conviction deepens that Christian truth is the only hope for this world. The greatest imperative of life is to get men and women to experience this truth and then under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to go out into the world to live and to teach it in all areas of life. Some day we will understand that our Sunday schools rank among the most important institutions of earth. They are organized to teach Christian truth to human beings.

The destiny of our nation depends more largely upon their success than our finite minds can grasp since they are our adopted means for implementing indispensable truth and for getting it into the hearts of men and women. They should have the full support and co-operation of all the people. It is literally true that there can

be no freedom of the highest order until it comes as a result of truth. The future of our great nation would be immersed in brilliant hope if the boys and girls of this nation could be enrolled in our Sunday schools and there taught the truth for successful living and service.
