4-H Clubs Work
To Cut Farm
Accident Toll

More than 1 1/2 million farm residents took enforced vacations last year due to accidents. In short, one out of every 17 farm people suffered a disabling accident.

Motor vehicle accidents now head the list of causes of fatalities to rural people, 7,300 of whom were killed due to collisions, blowouts and other highway mishaps in 1948.

The annual economic toll due to all types of farm accidents is now nearly one billion dollars!

In an all-out attempt to reduce these staggering figures, 4-H Club members throughout the nation are already engaged in the 1949 National 4-H Farm Safety program, reports Guy L. Noble, director, National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work.

Daily safety practice is stressed in farm buildings and yards, in use of farm machinery, handling livestock and in driving or walking on highways. Through county extension agents and local 4-H Club leaders, rural boys and girls are encouraged to check and remove conditions likely to cause accidents and fires, and promote safety practices in farm life. They are also taught to cooperate in community safety activities. The entire program is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.

As added incentives to produce good safety records, General Motors is again donating awards. Five sterling silver medals of honor are presented members in each county for best safety achievements. The state winner is given an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, and also an opportunity to be selected for national honors and one of the eight \$300 scholarships. The county reporting the most outstanding safety program in each state receives an engraved plaque of merit.

Get Ready For
Canning Season

Get ready for the canning season!

A pressure cooker is a valuable piece of equipment—it saves time and fuel, there's much less danger of losing food, and the high temperature obtained in the pressure cooker destroys harmful bacteria found in the food.

It is also a good time for the homemaker to check on her supply of lids and rings. If the bands from two-piece closures were removed and stored in a dry place, they will be ready for this season's use. Bands left on jars rust and may be ruined in removing them from the jar.

The next thing to check on is the supply of jars.

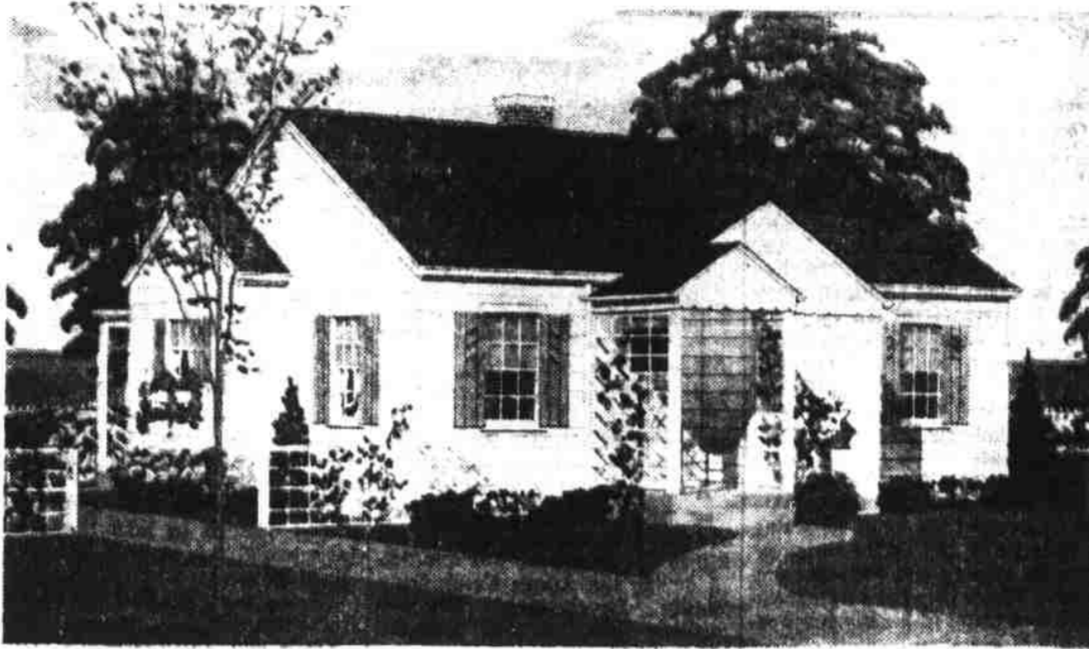
If the boiling water canner is no longer usable, it's time to begin looking for equipment to replace it. And if the home equipment includes a boiling water canner but there's no rack for it, now is the time to have a wooden one made. A rack allows the water to circulate freely around the jar. Much more even heat is given the jar by using a rack than using cloths or newspapers under jars when boiling in the boiling water canner.

There are small pieces of equipment that make canning easier, such as tongs, jar lifters, and jar fillers.

For a good top-of-the-stove dish cook macaroni according to the directions on the package and serve with a cheese sauce. Use a sharp cheddar cheese melted in a medium white sauce flavored with a little mustard.

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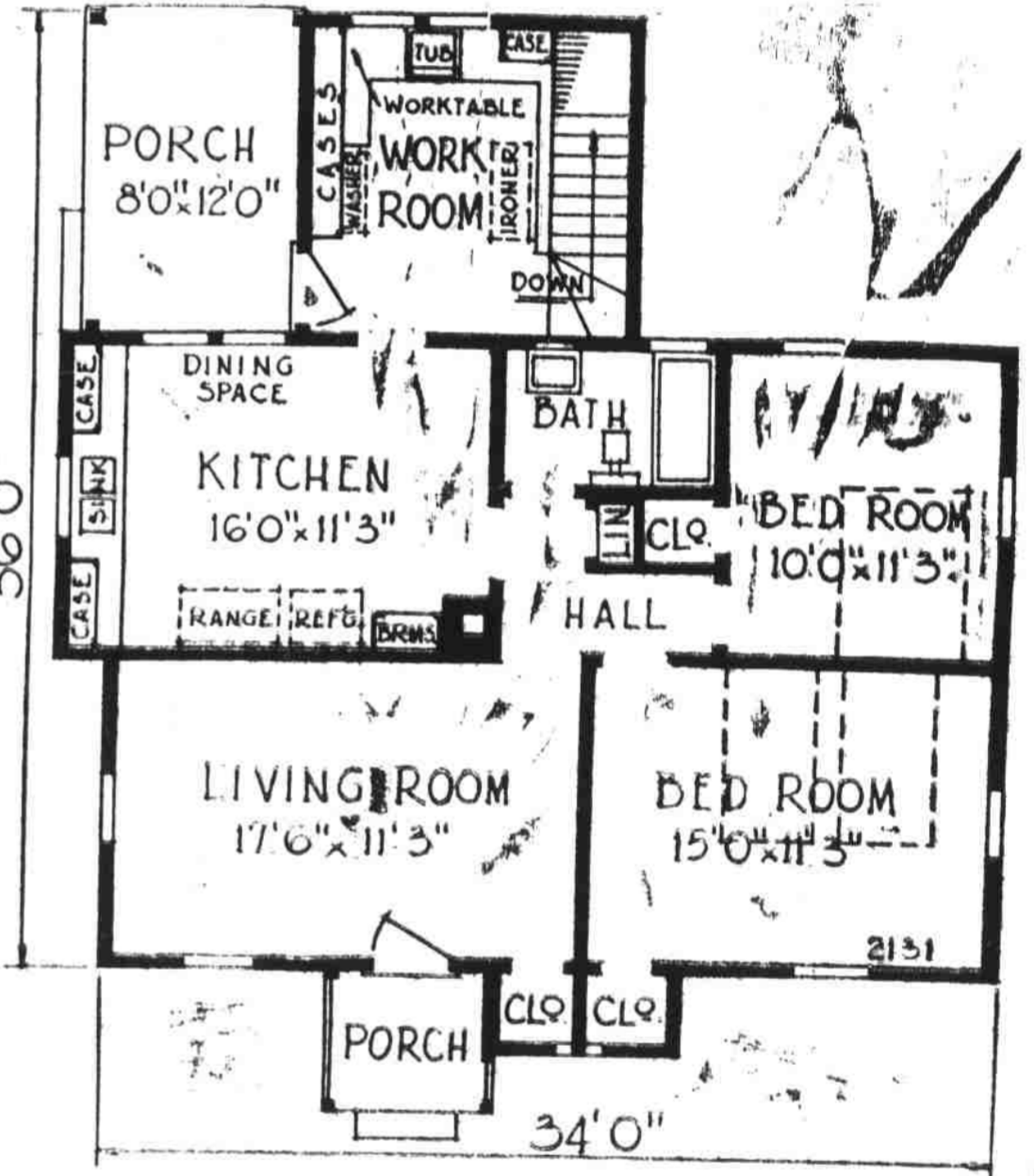
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A committee is working to arrange a program for the afternoon of Haywood County Day at Lake Junaluska, on June 5.
