The fourth annual meeting of the Laymen of the Western North Carolinaon, organized by the Methodist Youth Fund, will be held at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, June 21.

According to a statement prepared especially for the news, the Laymen

represent a gain of \$17,332 over last year's contribution.

Methodist Youth Fund receipts from the church as a whole totaled \$392,590, showing a net increase of \$18,334 for the same period. A number of large contributions were received too late to be included in the report.

The Methodist Youth Fund is the channel through which youth of the denomination help promote a program of mission, Christian education and youth work around the world, it was said by the Rev. Frank Ruppert, director of the Youth Department. It is administered jointly by the Woman's Division of the Methodist Board of Missions and Church Extension by the Joint Committee on Religious Education in Foreign Fields and by the General Board of Education. The fund, which was established only a few years ago, has been dominated since its incorporation by the missionary special for Methodist youth during the current Advance for Christ and His Church that was set up by the denomination. ### SONGS SUNG IN THE TEMPLE

ISRAELITES SING PRAISES TO GOD IN THE SYNAGOGUE

Scripture—Psalms 24, 84; 95:1-7.

EVEN IN the short space of time that the Bible notes on this Sunday School lesson were written, the Palestine picture has changed. Now the Republic of Israel is bounded with the old and holy city of Jerusalem as its capital.

Izrael has been accepted as a member of the United Nations, and the Jewish people of the earth have at last a homeland of their own. Their songs in the synagogue and temple must be ringing with thanksgiving to God for that blessing.

The 24th Psalm—a psalm of David—is a psalm welcoming the King of Glory to Jerusalem. The 22nd, 23rd and 24th Psalms have an interesting relation one to another. In the 23rd Christ is the Savior, in the 24th a plea for help in time of trouble. "Be not afraid of that day, O Lord; O my strength, hast Thee to help me."

"Blessed are they that dwell in Thy house; they will still be praising Thee, Sela."

In Psalm 84, too, is the oft-quoted statement, "For a day in Thy Courts is better than a thousand years." I had rather be a doormaster in the house of my God, than to dwell in the tents of wickedness."

In the sixth verse of this psalm, we read, "Who passing through the valley of Baca make it a well; the rain also filleth the pools." The word "baca" denotes some kind of balsam tree, and the "tears" are gum which the tree exudes.

The Vale of Baca was a waterless, barren valley through which pilgrims passed on their way to Jerusalem.

The 95th Psalm is a song of praise and thanksgiving:

"O come, let us sing unto the Lord; let us make a joyful noise to the rock of our salvation."

"Let us come before His presence with thanksgiving, and make a joyful noise unto Him with psalms."

"For the Lord is a great God, and a great King above all gods."

"For He is our God; and we are the people of His pasture, and the sheep of His hand."


