### Farm Questions and Answers

(Compiled by Extension Service at State College)

**Question:** The bottom leaves on my tomato plants are rolling, wilting and dropping off. What is the trouble?

**Answer:** Your tomatoes are probably infected with one or both of the wilt diseases. Most tomatoes in the eastern part of the State are affected this time of year. There are two main types of wilt that attack tomatoes—fusarium wilt and southern bacterial wilt. Certain varieties, including Marglobe, Rutgers, Pan American and the new Southland, are resistant to fusarium. One of these resistant varieties should be grown where soil is known to be wilt-infested. As yet, no variety has been developed that is resistant to Southern bacterial wilt. To get around this problem, the best idea is to plant your tomatoes early and try to get the crop off ahead of the hot summer weather.

**Question:** Why is it necessary to detassel corn being produced for hybrid seed?

**Answer:** Hybrid corn is nothing more than the corn that results when one pure line or strain is crossed with another. In normal field culture, there is no way of controlling the crossing or interbreeding of corn plants. The pollen from the tassel is likely to fall on the silk of the same plant, thus producing an inbred. To produce a hybrid, there must be some way to control the pollination to make sure that all the pollen is furnished by one line. Hence, the tassels are broken off from plants being used as the female line. All the pollen is furnished by plants being used as the male line.

### Noted Speakers Heard On Junaluska Programs

The Rev. Dr. Mark Depp, minister of Centenary Methodist Church at Winston-Salem featured speaker at Lake Junaluska Assembly Wednesday morning discussing the topic "The Church in the New Era."

"One must never suppose," said the speaker, "that the world is new, simply because we are not in it. The centuries have been many and the trek of humanity through the changing years has been long. Yet there are times when because of discoveries and special events, we seem to have a date with destiny. This may be such a time."

"In this new era the church as a household of Christ must be concerned with saving men and women from inner conflict and frustrations and with providing some relief from the forms of life if not to develop that moral integrity which all the more needs us in our complex modern world. It must call for action against the practical materialism of the day. And it must preach the gospel of reconciliation, not only between man and God but between man and his fellow."

Dr. Depp's address was second in a series of three under the auspices of the Lake Junaluska Assembly. He announced subject for Thursday is "Beauty in Religion." The Rev. Dr. W. B. Sebille, pastor at Gallop Memorial Church at Jackson, Miss., will be the featured noon-day speaker Friday.
