### Quaker Urges Making UN Strong Enough To Prevent World War III

Make the U. N. strong enough to prevent World War III was the appeal voiced from the Lake Junaluska platform Sunday night by Sam Levering, of Great Vershire and Mr. Tom N. C., nationally-known orator, economist and leader in the Society of Friends (Quakers).

The young Quaker, pale out of a background of active experience in world-wide business organization, and individuals who are prepared for peace as well as for the fight, urged religious convictions.

Levering, a member of the executive Council of World Federalism, and in his lecture tour over the country has taken part in Institutes of International Relations and in a series of atomic energy world government forums sponsored by the University of North Carolina in cooperation with the Oak Ridge Association of Atomic Scientists and the United World Federalists of North Carolina, of which he is the organizer.

In his talk Mr. Levering cited four factors as being necessary to the cause of peace, namely, the will to peace, justice, the machinery of peace and personal responsibility.

"Love, he said, is the strongest factor, but it is not enough unless we can bring about justice through the machinery of peace."

"Law applied to individuals on a world basis, enforced by civilian police with courts and police officers, is the only thing that deals with the armament race."

### Raleigh Pastor Discusses Origins Of Christianity

Speaking on Origins of the Christian movement, the Rev. Dr. E. McNeill Poteat, minister of Pullen Memorial Baptist Church in Raleigh, featured speaker at the Junaluska Methodist Assembly, said that the origin of the Christian movement presents in essence the conflict between three principles of social organization and control that have determined the nature of society from the times of its origins.

The first type, he said, concentrates authority in the strong individual. It is exhibited in the tribal chief or the national dictator and assumes that rule is best exercised by one outstanding and autonomous leader.

"The second method of social control," he continued, "both in historic development and idealism passes the authority from one man to several. This is variously called the oligarchical, the representative, or the bureaucratic method of government."

"Organization, while necessary for order, can become not only a nuisance when it arrogates to itself too great importance, but can become a positive hazard to true democratic participation."

"The third type, strong popular participation, seems to have been chosen as the way in which the movement we know as the Kingdom of God was projected."

"This is the meaning of Pentecost. Here in the symbolism of rushing wind, divided flame and polylingual utterance, the Holy Spirit is diffused on all members of the Community."

"Witness to the redemptive intentions of God was not confined to one voice or the voice of an apostolate."

"All became the spokesmen of the redemption wrought by Jesus Christ. For this ministry they were scattered abroad throughout the Roman World and the Christian Movement became the first great popular religious movement in history."

"This is the origin of the democratic experience as we know it today, even in its modified forms."

## Sunday School Lesson

### DAVID SINGS SONGS OF TRUST

PSALMS EXPRESS RELIANCE ON GOD'S GOODNESS

Scripture—Psalms 34, 37, 46, 91, 138: 3, 7, 143: 8.

THE AFTERMATH of World War II has left the world jittery, restless, fearful of what may be in store for it. After two dreadful conflicts, the hope of making a lasting peace seems remote, with nations contending against their neighbors in seemingly endless arguments.

David the King, passed through many conflicts, experienced many serious sins, brought on by his own passions or selfish, shortsighted desires. He, however, managed to retain his trust in the goodness of the Almighty and attain a serene outlook on his troublesome life in spite of all.

In the Psalms allotted to our lesson today he reiterated this faith and may we not also rely on our experience to secure a more hopeful outlook with a resolve that we will, by our attitude toward life and our actions do at least a little to help our generation to make that "brave new world" we all so ardently desire?

"O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt His name together."

"I sought the Lord, and He heard me, and delivered me from all my fears."  
For small children this lesson may be quite difficult, but one way to interest them is to ask of what they are afraid. Some would answer, "the dark"; some "dogs," or other animals, neighborhood bullies, storms, etc.

Fathers and mothers can do much to allay such fears. They can point out that darkness is only absence of light, and that if a child is afraid of it, he can imagine he is looking at the room or the outdoors when it is light, and that nothing is changed except that all things are resting in the peaceful darkness. The beauties of darkness—with perhaps the beautiful stars and the moon shining so softly down on all—can be used to interest him to learn of his universe and so banish fear.

Parents can explain that most domestic creatures are friendly to man, and if they are treated kindly, will respond. Trust is at the bottom of these attitudes. Trust in God.

David wrote of himself, "This answered me, and strengthened me, with strength in my soul."  
"Though I walk in the midst of trouble, Thou wilt revive me: Thou shalt stretch forth Thine hand against the wrath of mine enemies, and Thy right hand shall save me."  
If we would gain David's trust in God, and lean on it, and so trusting, do our very best to do what is right, "He will make thy righteousness to go forth as the light, and thy justice as the noonday."—the psalmist says.  
And, finally, in Psalm 143:8, David says: "Cause me to hear Thy loving-kindness in the morning; for in Thee do I trust; cause me to know the way wherein I should walk, for I lift up my soul unto Thee."  
As we recall David's troubled and adventurous life, how he was forced to flee from home and hide in caves and other lonely, desolate places, in danger of his life, while his enemy, King Saul, had him hunted down, we can imagine his thankfulness to God who had been with him all the time and had strengthened him.

"We must work for peace, not just to save our own skins, but because it is right."  
"It is wrong to go slaughtering and killing. God is a God of law and order. As his physical world is ruled by natural laws, so must the world of nations abide by such Bible principles, as Thou Shalt Not Kill and Thou Shalt Not Steal."  
The speaker viewed the present international situation as a lull in rather than an end to the cold war and warned that unless national armaments are brought under control, World War II may occur within the present generation. He pleaded for strengthening UN agencies and that there be no reduction of aid under the Marshall Plan.
