A list of classifications and specimens to be shown is given below.

CLASSIFICATIONS.

Section A - 1. Arrangement for wall table. 2. Arrangement for coffee table. 3. Arrangement for informal luncheon table. 4. Arrangement for informal dinner table.

Section B - 1. Large arrangement not over 36 inches. 2. Large arrangement for porch or fireplace.

Section C - 1. A line arrangement using one type of flower. 2. An arrangement using a figurine as an accessory or container. 3. An arrangement in unusual container, as gourd, wood, etc.

Section D - 1. Miniature arrangement not to exceed three inches in either dimension. 2. Miniature not to exceed five inches in height.

Section E - 1. Oriental arrangement, background and accessories permitted.

Section F - One color arrangement. 1. Bowl. 2. Vase.

Section G - 1. Arrangement of fruit and vegetables. 2. Arrangement of fruit. 3. Arrangement of vegetables.

Section H - 1. Arrangement in autumn colors. 2. Arrangement of foliage or weeds.

Section I - 1. Cool arrangement: cool colors, as blue, green or white.

Section J - 1. Arrangement in pair of containers.

Section K - 1. Arrangement for picnic table for porch or lawn.

Section L - 1. Victorian arrangement. 2. Modern arrangement—accessories may be used.

Section M - 1. Shadow box.

Section N - 1. Exhibition. 2. Decorative. 3. Cactus flowered. 4. Liliplum.

Zinnias - 3 blooms—1. Giant. 2. Dwarf. 3. Mexican.

Roses - 3 of any variety—1. Tea. 2. Annuals. 3. Floribunda (one cluster).

Marigold - 3 blooms—1. Giant. 2. Dwarf. 3. French.

Gladioli - 1. One Spike, any variety. 2. Collection.

Tuberous Begonia - 1. One bloom and foliage.

Snapdragon - 1. Single spike. 2. Collection.

Petunias - 3 blooms—1. Double. 2. Single.

Miscellaneous Flowers—1. Three of any kind.

Section O - 1. Wild flowers: collection or named specimens.

Section P - Table Settings: 1. Formal. 2. Informal.
