

Cecil Host To Allens Creek Saturday In Field Day Program, Farm Tour

More than 225 people participated in the Field Day last Saturday when Allens Creek residents were guests of the people of Cecil.

In the afternoon contests, the visitors defeated their hosts, 236 to 139.

The farm and home tour opened the Field Day program, starting at 9:30 a.m.

Going first to the Riverside Church, the visitors heard the Rev. Tom Erwin point out and discuss the improvements that had been made to the buildings and grounds in the Community Development Program.

After leaving the church, they went to the farm of Howard Moore and examined Mr. Moore's outstanding fields of corn and tobacco.

Mr. Moore emphasized the importance of proper fertilization on corn, tobacco and pasture.

Then they went to the Lemon Moody farm to see some outstanding Aberdeen-Angus cattle, one of the outstanding Aberdeen-Angus bulls in North Carolina.

Mr. Moody emphasized the value of a good bull. The group also saw the fish pond where Mr. Moody has and it was brought out at this stop that any of the farms could have this fish pond with very little cost.

Then to the Sunburst Herd Ranch where Mrs. Edith Young showed the group 3,000 turkeys and how they were looking after them. It was also brought out at this stop the value of the poultry business.

Then to the Champion Paper and Pulp Plantations at Lake Logan where Ted Davis, Champion forester, discussed with the group what had been done in foresting at Lake Logan.

The group witnessed some forest plantations which had been planted around 18 years to see the wonderful growth that had been made. This was one of the outstanding stops on the tour.

Tennessee Experiments In Socialized Medicine

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (U. P.)—More than 1,500 Tennessee physicians have agreed to set fees and 13 private insurance companies are writing policies under the Tennessee Medical Association's plan for prepaid surgical and obstetrical insurance.

On the set fee basis, the insurance would cover surgical and obstetrical bills in full for insured persons with an income of \$2,400 or less a year and for all insured persons with dependents whose total family income is \$3,600 or less a year. Persons earning more than that can take out the insurance, but the physician is not bound to accept the set fee as his full payment.

Officials of the medical association estimate that 70 per cent of Tennessee's population would be entitled to full coverage.

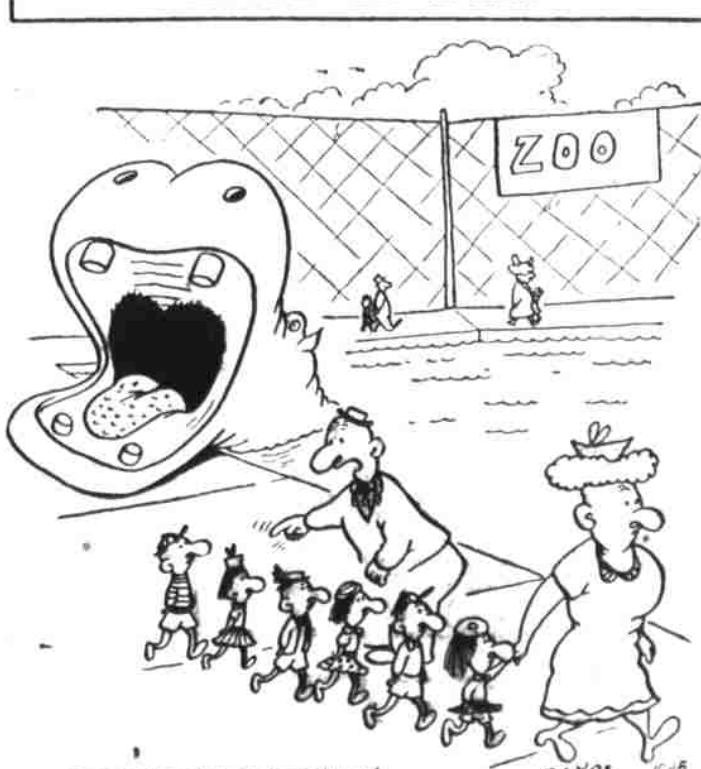
