Section B—1. Large arrangement not over 36 inches. 2. Large arrangement for porch or fireplace.

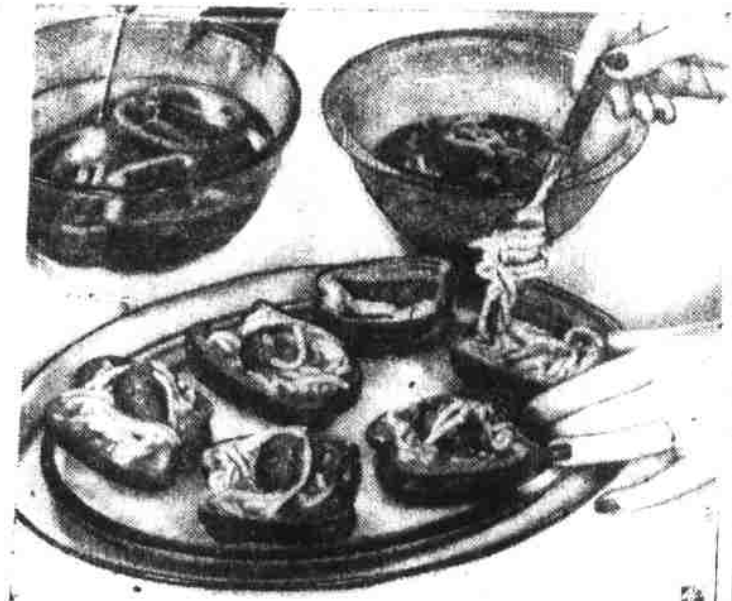
Section C—1. A line arrangement using one type of flower. 2. An arrangement using a figurine as an accessory or container. 3. An arrangement in unusual container.

## Quick Mealtime Tricks With Canned Meats

For summer buffet meals, quickie style, you can use canned meats to good advantage. There are lots to choose from—luncheon meats, spaghetti and meat balls, corned beef hash, Vienna sausage, chili con carne, tongue, deviled meats, hamburgers, frankfurters, stews and ham. Only the large canned hams require refrigeration; the other canned meats can be ready and waiting on the pantry shelf.

### PRETTY PEPPER SPAGHETTI

**Ingredient:** 2 green peppers, 1 can spaghetti and meatballs.  
**Method:** Cut peppers in half lengthwise and remove tops and seeds and white membrane. Wash in cold water, then blanch in boiling water. Spoon spaghetti into pepper halves, placing a meatball on top. Place in a shallow baking dish and bake in a hot (375) oven for 30 minutes.

### LUNCHEON MEAT POTATO CASSEROLE

**Ingredients:** 1 twelve-ounce can luncheon meat, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons dried green pepper, 3 cups 5 medium cooked diced potatoes.

**Method:** Cut luncheon meat in 6 one-third-inch slices; dice remaining. Melt butter or margarine in saucepan over low heat. Remove from heat, blend in flour and salt. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly; return to medium heat stirring until mixture thickens and boils. Add green pepper, diced luncheon meat, and potatoes. Turn into 1 1/2 quart casserole. Top with slices of luncheon meat. Bake in a moderate hot (400) oven about 20 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

### LUNCHEON MEAT POTATO SALAD SANDWICHES

**Ingredients:** 3 cups 5 medium cooked diced potatoes, 1 table spoon finely chopped or grated onion, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 2 tablespoons salad oil, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup diced celery or cucumber, 1/4 cup dried green pepper, 1 cup mayonnaise, 1 twelve-ounce can luncheon meat.

**Method:** Place potatoes in a mixing bowl; add onion, vinegar, salad oil, and salt. Toss lightly with two forks so as not to break potatoes. Cover and place in refrigerator to chill. Add remaining ingredients and toss until well mixed. Place 6 slices of luncheon meat on serving platter. Put spoonful of potato salad on each slice. Top with second slice of luncheon meat. Makes 6 servings.

### State College Hints To Farm Homemakers

A clean kitchen range looks and also cooks better than one allowed to gather grease, spilled food, dust or rust. Household equipment specialists say. For full, even, efficient heat cleanliness is important. Reflecting surfaces must be kept shining to do their job of throwing out heat. A clean range also helps keep the kitchen clean and free of unnecessary smoke and odors.

Some general hints on cleaning methods are:

Wipe up spills and splatters promptly with a dry cloth or paper. Acid foods may eat into enamel surfaces if left on. Other foods, especially grease, may seep on until they are difficult to remove except by strenuous scouring, likely to be hard on the surface. Grease comes off most easily when fresh and hot.

Metal and porcelain surfaces need frequent washing with a cloth moistened in warm suds of mild soap or a detergent, but this should be done only after the stove cools. A wet cloth on a hot stove is a hazard to hands and may crack enamel. Many good housekeepers make an after-the-dishes habit of washing the stove. Go easy on water, the specialists say, so that it does not drip or run down sides or into burners, leaving streaks or rust.

Charred particles on burners or heating units, or in the bottom of the oven may be brushed out after the stove cools.
