Poisonous Plants

Among our poisonous plants are poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac. During the summertime, persons who enter the woods, travel along creeks or other waterways, or walk through fields along fences, hedgerows or stone walls should be especially careful. It is well to make it a point to learn just what these plants look like, at in addition, what to do if infected. There is no such thing as immunity to poison ivy. Persons who have avoided infection previously, after repeated contact with these plants, may develop poisoning through subsequent exposures, under different conditions.
