Successor Named
To Alexander's
Vacated State Job

The Associated Press reported that Governor Scott appointed Dr. Locke Robinson of Mars Hill Monday night to Tom Alexander's vacated post on the State Board of Conservation and Development.

Mr. Alexander, owner of the Cataloochee Ranch, said earlier that day he had filed his resignation with the governor the previous week-end.

He had been named by Scott to the board only a few weeks previously.

The Associated Press story from Raleigh gave the dispute between the governor and the board over the state advertising program as the reason for the Haywood man's resignation.

The wire service quoted Mr. Alexander as saying he resigned because he thought an "effort is going to be made to award" the state contract on a "political basis."

Dr. Robinson, 46-year-old native of Madison County, is serving in his first public office in filling the state board position. He is a member of the American Medical Association, the American Heart Association, and the Mars Hill Civitan Club.

The physician has been practicing in Mars Hill for about 20 years.

ed to succeed him, Scott said he finally got around to looking over the letter yesterday morning.

There was no discussion or telephoning, Scott explained.

"I just named another man," he said. "Plenty of them want to serve."

If any one else is planning to walk out, Scott quipped, "we can handle other resignations."

"We're not drumming up any," he added, "but if they don't want to serve we're not going to stand in their way. There's no shortage of people to replace them."

BOARD.—Alexander set his course last Wednesday at a meeting of the board's advertising committee by voting with Committee Chairman Josh Horne against a motion to vacate the State advertising contract.

The contract was awarded approximately 18 months ago to Avers & Gillett of Charlotte. Anti-administration forces charge it now will go to a new firm, Eastman-Redwine, formed recently by Bob Redwine, Scott supporter in the primaries.

There has been no sign yet that Horne, Rocky Mount newspaper publisher and vice chairman of the board, will quit. In fact, Horne has modified his stand slightly since the stormy committee meeting. A

letter received from him by Director George Ross of the Department of Conservation and Development indicates he is ready to forget the battle and go ahead with the program.

REDWINE.—Alexander, said newsmen who quoted him regarding his resignation, was very commonly talked into the Governor owed a political debt to one Robert Redwine and promised to repay it with the advertising contract.

Scott yesterday said on the talk was groundless.

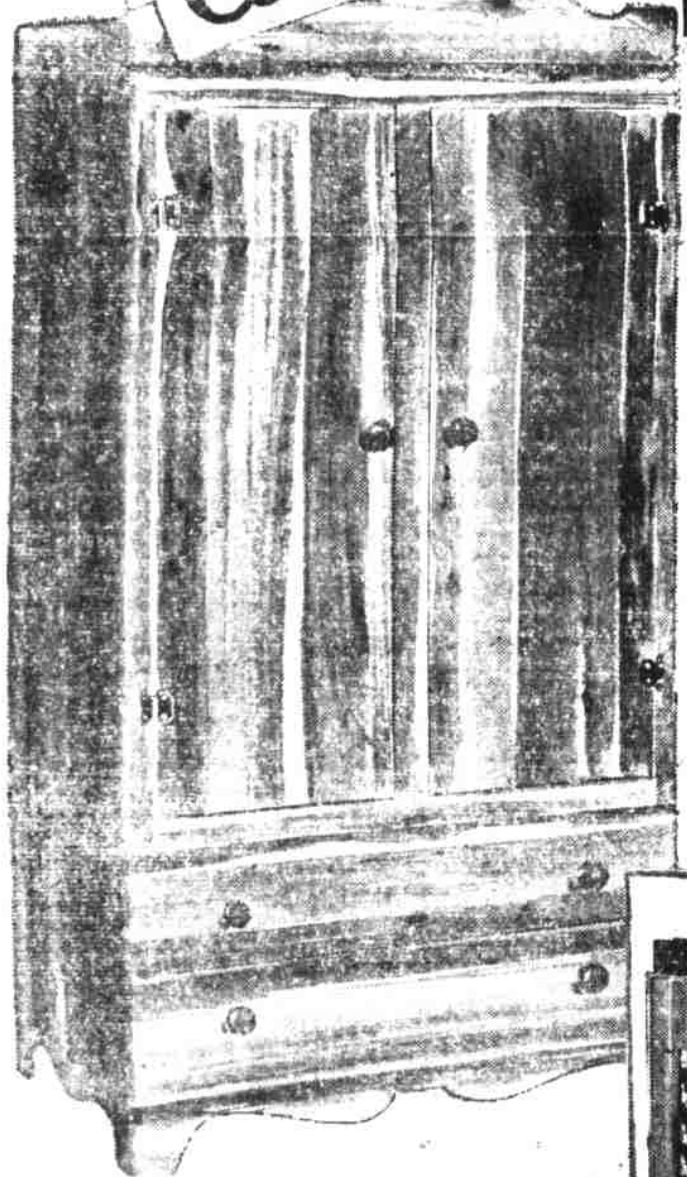
He said he made no promise to any one except those he made a part of his platform.

"Absolutely, I promised nothing," he said. "I have told nothing if he gets the contract it will be satisfactory with me."

If Redwine does get the contract, Scott said, it will be because he has satisfied the Division of Purchase and Contract, and the State Board of Award that he is the best man to handle it.

The reason for moving out of the contract from the Department of Conservation and Development to the Division of Purchase and Contract, Scott pointed out, is to free it from possible "political implications" and not to create the fact that he, Scott, as director of the budget is ministerial.

Scott added, it doesn't mean he emphasized, that he will use from the budget.
