**Western Desert Once Fertile Lake Land**

LA JOLLA, Cal. (UP)—The sandy, scrubbrush-covered area of California's Mojave Desert and most of Nevada once was a "land of lakes," an oceanographer at Scripps Institute reports.

During the great ice age and after the retreat of the glaciers, the scientist said numerous streams and lakes existed in the area which was then inhabited by a wide variety of moisture-loving plants and animals. That occurred in the relatively recent past of about 20,000 years ago, he estimated, when the area was a fertile, well-watered territory.

**One "Forest Fire" Fails To Excite Anyone**

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. (UP)—A fire raged out of control in Coconino National Forest for many days but no one was concerned.

Nor did forestry officials send equipment to fire guards into the area 12 miles south of here.

The fire, Control Chief Kenneth Wilson explained, consisted of a barren, dead tree which had been killed by lightning. There was little danger of the blaze spreading, since the tree stood 200 yards off-base in Lower Lake Mary and was completely surrounded by water.

### Smallest Rubber Mill Claimed By Buffalo

BUFFALO, N. Y. (UP)—The University of Buffalo lays claim to the smallest rubber mill in the world.

Developed in the chemistry laboratories of the university, it can compound samples of rubber as small as one-half of a gram. In comparison, industrial rubber mills handle 300 to 400-pound samples.

The tiny mill, driven by a one-third horsepower motor, has rolls four inches long and one and one-half inches in diameter. It has a maximum capacity of ten grams.

The kitchen of The Columbia is also convenient to the front door. A door in the rear hall connects the kitchen to the center bedroom.

Wardrobe closets are built into every one of the three bedrooms. Handy coat closets are provided at both the front and rear entrances. There is a large general storage closet in the bedroom hall and a linen cabinet in the bathroom.

The main body of The Columbia is 28 feet by 40 feet with 1008 square feet and a volume of 19,756 cubic feet.
