Mr. Owen is a graduate of the Waynesville High School and Biltmore College. He served for three years with the U. S. Navy and is

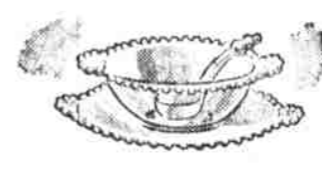
**now a member of the rising senior class at Eastern Carolina Teachers College.**
