Christian Faith Must Be Integrated In World Needs, Seminary Head Says

Dr. Joseph E. Sizoo, president of the (Presbyterian) New Brunswick, N. J., Theological Seminary, spoke under the auspices of the Junaluska Assembly, Monday night on the theme, "The Relevance of Jesus for our Time."

The speaker stressed the importance of integrating the Christian faith into world needs. God has a stake, he said, in housing developments, fighting hunger, disease and human misery, and unless we can implement the love of God into the needs of the world, there will be no tomorrow for our day.

"It is no good fighting Russia to get rid of Communism," he said. "The Christian church must go with the gospel to where people live."

"Life after the fashion of Jesus must have moral content and spiritual awareness."

"Two things Jesus never considered," the speaker continued. "One was geography and the other was time."

"He never traveled over 100 miles from his home; he did not begin to preach until he was thirty and two years later he was dead."

"But Jesus Christ is at home in every country and in every century; he is a part of the ongoing life of every generation."

"He is relevant for our time because he lived his life in two directions; he lived with an awareness of God and of man."

"He cultivated companionship with God and compassion for man. He lived within these two areas but he always kept his perspective and balance."

"He lived with a God-consciousness never before known on earth and the most memorable quality of his life was his approachableness. He identified himself with the needs of his followers."

"He showed the world an outstretched arm; he did not build barricades like modern dictators; he built bridges."

"He identified himself with the

paralytic, the leper, the blind, the prodigal. "In them he lived through them he found strength and the cause of them he died." "He lived with a love that would not let God go and he lived with a love that would not let man go. "Here is the pattern and the name of worthwhileness. In that way of life there is peace and joy and love. We were made to love that way. For God is our father and we are his children. "We were meant to live after the pattern of Jesus, with moral content and spiritual awareness."
