ing the fall in Chicago, they returned to Western North Carolina, but before deciding where they would live, came to Waynesville to check on the hospital facilities. When assured the hospital would be completed, they moved to Waynesville, close to the new institution.

Workmen were still putting the finishing touches to the building when Mrs. Miller entered the hospital, and Bill was born the 17th of March. She was dismissed 11 days later. The Millers and their two sons remained here until September of that year, and then returned to Chicago. On May 1, 1940, they moved back to Waynesville "for good" and built a home on the Hill Creek road.

While Mr. Miller's work has taken him to Chicago on many occasions, he is arranging his practice to spend more and more time here.

"We are living here today because of the hospital. Without it, we would have never considered this community, even with all its beauty, and many advantages," the Millers said.

said calmly, almost simultaneously: "Well, this is the finish." The car sailed 30 feet through the air, summersaulted, struck the almost vertical slope, and turned over three times, breaking large saplings before it came to rest on one side 150 feet below the edge of the highway.
