Plato Domino II, owned by Dr. A. P. Cline of Cecil, brought the top price of the 43 Herefords sold last Thursday at the Western North Carolina Hereford Breeders Association sale at Biltmore.

Dr. Cline's champion bull went to Frank O. Sherrill of Charlotte and Hendersonville, owner of the S & W restaurant chain, for \$1,275.

Biggest conquirer at the sale, however, was Dr. J. L. Reeves, the Association president from Canton, who sold 11 females.

Other cattlemen from Haywood County who sold at the event were R. C. Evans, Clyde High School agriculture teacher, who consigned one female; C. T. Francis of Ralcliffe Cove, consigned one female; Roy S. Haynes of Clyde, consigned a bull; Vernon Haynes of Clyde, consigned one female; and David Underwood of Waynesville, consigned one female.

Dr. Cline, chairman of the Cecil Community Development Program, also consigned a female in addition to his prize bull.

Plato's father was the 1948 champion.

The buyers paid an average \$435 for each of the animals auctioned by Earl Gartner of Greenville, Ind.

Mr. Sherrill bought 11 animals to top the other purchasers.

Nantahala Domino Lass III, owned by Dr. F. M. Killian of Franklin, the champion female, went to Dr. J. Cash of Chesnee, S. C., for \$745.

Cattlemen from Buncombe, Henderson, and Macon counties, in addition to Haywood, were at the sale, which attracted approximately 600 farmers.

Rotarians Working For World Peace, Says Past Pres.

"Rotary is working harder for world peace than most people realize," Kendrick S. Guernsey, former president of Rotary International, and summer resident here said Friday, in a brief talk to the Club.

"The Rotarians of the world are working for world-wide peace on the basis of a better understanding of the peoples of the world," the former international president said.

Several years ago a movement was started whereby an exchange of boys and girls from all countries of the world for studying in other countries was completed. During the past year 111 fellowships were given by the Rotary Foundation, and this year a quarter of a million dollars will be spent on the project. Rotary has built up a fund of two million dollars for the promotion of peace.

The boys and girls have to have as their life ambition the desire to foster and encourage goodwill and peace on a worldwide basis, Mr. Guernsey, who is now chairman of the committee, said.

Labor And Bosses Can Keep Reds Out ILO Delegate Says

BALTIMORE (UP)—This country's employer delegate to the International Labor Organization says U. S. capitalism is overlooking what could be its most potent weapon against Communism — human relations.

"Communism never will gain a sure foothold in the United States if a majority of American business firms will take active steps to make sure that American workers are proud of and satisfied with their jobs," Charles P. McCormick contends.

"We must research our practices of capitalism, review them analytically, bring them up to date, and arrive at the enlightened capitalism which I believe is that which holds a responsibility for the welfare of people on a par with the responsibility for making a profit."

McCormick, appointed to the ILO by President Truman on recommendation of the National Association of Manufacturers, U. S. Chamber of Commerce and other business agencies, believes he is capable of counseling business on how to reach the "enlightened" stage.

Beware Of Disease Hazard At Cattle Shows

Farmers who exhibit livestock at fairs and shows were cautioned today by Dr. C. D. Grinnells, professor of veterinary science at State College, to make sure their animals do not bring disease hazards home with their blue ribbons.

"No matter what stringent sanitary measures have been taken at fairs, any animal shown where large groups of other animals have been assembled should be handled as if it had been exposed to infection," Dr. Grinnells said.

The American Foundation for Animal Health recommends a minimum quarantine period of 30 days for all animals after fair exhibition, before they are permitted to join the home herds. The Foundation pointed out that while an animal may appear perfectly healthy, it can be harboring deadly disease germs contracted from an equally healthy-looking animal at a fair, show, or livestock sale.

Dr. Grinnells urged that all livestock returning from fairs be checked by a veterinarian. Such a procedure, he said, has a two-fold purpose if the animal is infected. First, special precautions can be taken to see that the disease does

Wood Treating Demonstration To Be Held Here This Week

Haywood county farmers will have an opportunity to learn effective methods of wood treating this week.

For the next three days, demonstrations of treating wood to prevent destruction by termites will be given at the Haywood Lumber Supply Company of Waynesville.

Cooperating in the demonstrations, starting tomorrow, are the Tennessee Valley Authority, the State College Extension Service, and the Forestry Department of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

R. A. Vogenbush, a specialist who will take part in the demonstrations, explained that the termite method of insecticide treatment, using copper borate solution.

The chemical, he said, is the same action against termites as sodium cyanide, but does not harm the health of the person who uses it, and is cheaper than cyanide.

Another advantage, he said, is that treated wood does not rot.

One thousand pounds of sodium borate can be treated with 100 pounds of cyanide at a cost of \$100.

At the same time, a wood preservative treatment with 100 pounds of cyanide will lengthen the life of a tree for 10 to 15 years.

Pine posts are treated with a preservative as satisfactory for their purposes as the formal preservative in common use, Mrs. Vogenbush added.

The TVA's mobile treating unit will be at the store for the demonstrations.

In charge will be Dr. C. D. Grinnells, TVA forester. Other speakers will be Dr. C. D. Grinnells, Dr. H. H. district forester for the State Forestry Division, and H. H. Price, TVA forester.

The first demonstration will start at 1:30 p. m. tomorrow, and will be at 10 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. Wednesday, and 10 a. m. Thursday.
