New Mittens Have Warmth

Mothers and children will welcome a new type of mitten, double-fleece lined for warmth and coated with neoprene, the duPont rubber, to keep small hands dry when making snowballs or building snowmen.

The tough, durable, waterproof neoprene coating prevents the lining of the mittens from absorbing water, and eliminates the discomfort of wet, chapped hands.

Called Eskimitts, the new mittens are roomy enough for complete hand-freedom, but are fitted around the wrist with closely knit, double-thickness wrist bands, which prevent snow from sifting down inside.

Part of the mittens' wristlets are also coated with neoprene, providing added protection from melting snow and rain. The wrist bands and the neoprene coating are brilliant red, the color most apt to capture the eye of a child.

The soft, woolly lining of the mittens consists of two layers of fleece which will keep hands warm even in very cold weather. According to tests made by the U.S. Army, more warmth is gained through multiple layers of cloth than through one heavy thickness.

Economy Mothers will also appreciate the economy of the mittens. They will give longer wear because of the neoprene coating, which is designed to withstand rough usage and resist tearing. Unlike natural rubber, neoprene will not become soft or otherwise deteriorate through exposure to the bright sun.

The mittens come in three sizes, small, medium and large.
