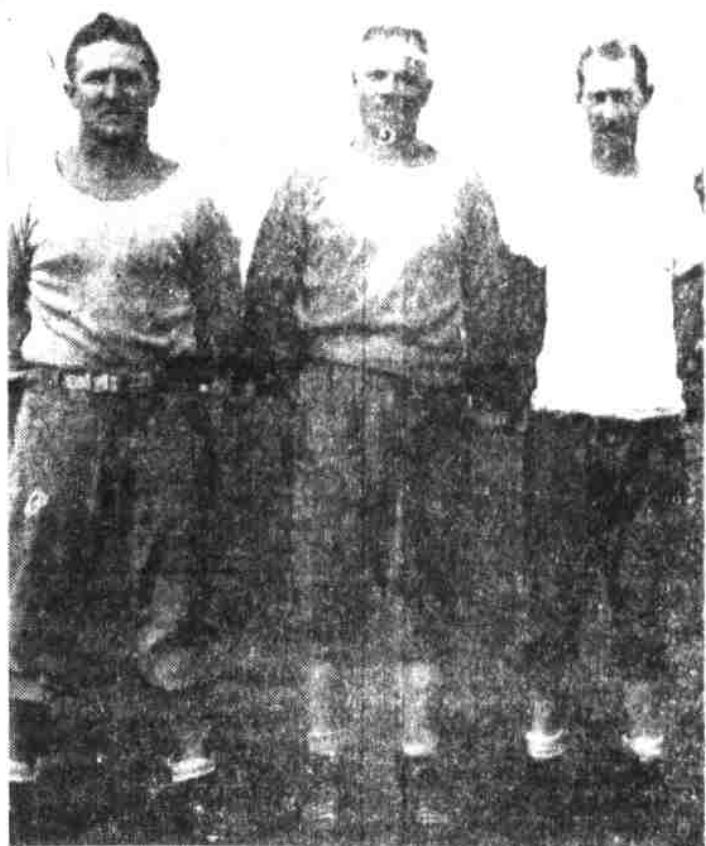


Canton Bears Suffer First Loss Of Season

The Bears' record of 1948 was 1-1 and one loss to Monroe Friday night have already given them a much brighter season than last year's. They tackle powerful Lenoir Friday night at Canton.

Monroe Has Outstanding Team, Won By 20-0 Score

A bigger, powerful Monroe High School eleven crushed Canton High School's hopes for an unbeaten season Friday night on the Monroe gridiron.

The heavily favored Monroe team, paced by a booming 160-pound fullback named Hunter Hadley, scored once in the opening period, the second, and third to hand a fighting band of Black Bears a 20-0 defeat.

It was Canton's first loss in three games this season after they'd defeated Sand Hill and Forest City. Still playing without the services of Tackle Francis Phipps, one of their main defensive linemen, Coach Don Hips' boys were forced to yield ground time and again to the powerful drives of the big Monroe fullback.

Hadley, a 45-year drive, that gave Monroe a first touch down when he crashed over from the one yard line early in the first period.

He paced the second scoring drive in the second quarter as Monroe drove 60 yards. Tackle O. N. Howie would it with his play from half a foot out.

The big fullback set on the third and final Monroe touchdown when he took the opening kickoff after interception and pumped it 46 yards.

Then he and Tackle Marion Grantland alternated to move the ball to the two and Hadley rammed through the line for the score.

Canton's running star, Halfback Neil Blumer, playing his final game since the opening two weeks ago, and Passing Ace Bobby Moore were continuous threats through the game.

But the hard charging Monroe line prevented Blumer from getting any yardage.

Bobby Moore did recover frequently with his buffer passes, but the ball got away from him.

Only two of his ten aerials were completed. Three others, which might have gone for touchdowns, dropped through receiver hands.

Canton's only season threat came in the final period when the Black Bears drove to the Monroe 44. But the defensive hold and squelched the drive.

The Black Bears got in a bit of the opening kickoff and couldn't work themselves out of it.

They recovered their own fumble of the Monroe kickoff that started the game and the ball went into play on the Black Bear 35 yard line.

Law Bans Hunting On Sundays

Haywood County Fish and Game Protector C. W. Ormand reminded hunters as the season neared that the law forbids hunting on Sundays.

He also pointed out that a permit is required before anyone can hunt game birds or game animals into this state.

The first part of the dove season opened Sept. 16 and will close Sept. 30.

At the same time, he reminded fishermen that all trout waters are closed to all fishing.

He outlined the following season dates: Coon: November 1 through February 1.

Rabbit: November 10 through January 10 that limit seven a day.

Squirrel: October 1 to December 15 that limit six a day.

Quail: November 24 through January 10 that limit eight per day.

Game stuffed: October 1 through January 2 that limit two per day.

Bear: October 15 through January 2 except that part of the county north of US High 19-23, where bear may not be taken from November 14 through December 5.

Deer (white-tail): November 14 through December 5, except the part of the county lying north of US High 19-23, which is closed to deer hunting.

Organized Hunts Slated For Pisgah This Autumn

The U. S. Forest Service and the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission have cooperated again this year to establish rules and regulations for organized deer hunts in National Forest areas, according to Clyde P. Patton, Executive Director of the Wildlife Commission.

Following are the dates for the hunts: Mount Mitchell: November 15, 16 and December 6, 7, with 100 hunters permitted on each 2-day hunt; Daniel Boone: November 15, 16, and December 6, 7, with 150 hunters allowed per 2-day hunt; Standing Indian: November 17, 18, 19, November 24, 25, 26, and December 1, 2, 3, with 75 hunters allowed per 3-day hunt; Fires Creek: November 17, 18, 19, and November 24, 25, 26, with 50 hunters allowed per 3-day hunt; Sherwood: West Fork Pigeon River; November 21, 22, 23, and November 28, 29, 30, East Fork, Pigeon River; November 23, 25, 26, and December 1, 2, 3, with 100 hunters allowed per 3-day hunt.

Application blanks may be obtained from game protectors and U. S. Forest Service offices, or by writing direct to the Wildlife Resources Commission, Raleigh. Application must be received by the Raleigh office of the Wildlife Commission by October 31, and must be accompanied by check or money orders in the amount of \$5.00 for 2-day hunts or \$7.50 for 3-day hunts.

Public drawings will be held to determine successful applicants as follows: Mt. Mitchell and Daniel Boone, 10:00 a. m., October 17, County Courthouse, Marion; Sherwood, 10:00 a. m., October 18, City Police Court, Canton; Standing Indian and Fires Creek, 10:00 a. m., October 19, County Courthouse, Franklin; Pigeon River will be returned to unsuccessful applicants.

Organized hunts on the Pisgah National Game Preserve will be held November 14 - December 3, in a series of 2-day periods, and will include various types of hunts and special box and cross hunt. Both bear and deer may be taken in the Pisgah National Game Preserve but no dogs will be allowed. A notice describing the Court House on December 10, 1948, on October 25 will describe the successful applicant. Applications must be submitted in the same manner as for the other hunts.

Complete details regarding the administration of the hunts may be obtained from the Wildlife Resources Commission, Raleigh, North Carolina.

WCTC Beats Appalachian; Leads Loop

The Western Carolina Mountaineers buried another big obstacle last weekend on their road to the 1949 North State Conference football championship.

Tailback Preveer Hamilton led Tom Young's forces to a 13-6 victory Saturday night over the defending champion Appalachian State Mountaineers.

It was Fullback Ralph McConnell who broke the 6-6 deadlock in the final period as he slammed over for the winning touchdown. He had also scored the first.

Hamilton's running and passing, however, paced the Catamount offense.

The Catamounts, leading the loop with victories over the Mountaineers and High Point, still have to overcome a dangerous East Carolina Teachers eleven which was barely edged, 21-20, by a powerful Lenoir Rhyne squad, and Lenoir Rhyne before they can clinch the title.

The Catamounts meet ECTC, rebounding under a new coach, Bill Doyle, at Canton on October 15 and play Lenoir Rhyne at Cullowhee on the following week-end.

Next week-end, they go out of league play to meet Tusculum at Greenville, Tenn.

City Gives Children Chance to Survive

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Children under school age now may receive a complete physical examination and immunization shots free under a new clinic service established by the Pittsburgh health department.

The free clinic offers eye and dental examinations and hearing tests, in addition to general physical checkups, and immunizations against smallpox, whooping cough and diphtheria. Tuberculin tests of a wall be administered to determine whether a child has been exposed to the disease.

The infant clinic, described as one of the most complete in the nation, was set up through the combined efforts of city health officials, hospital, physicians and technicians.

St. Luke's Hospital donated the room, in its dispensary for the examination. Staff members of the University of Pittsburgh's department of pediatrics and department of audiology and psychology supervised their services. The local chapter of the Red Cross provided a nutritionalist.

Dr. Clarence L. Marrus, chief of maternal and infant services for the city, said the importance of the clinic lies in the fact that children grow rapidly in their first few years.

"This is a great thing," Health Director Dr. I. Hope Alexander said. "It's like nipping hygiene germs in the bud. We want to prevent disease before it begins."
