Plans are going ahead for the Fair to be sponsored by the West Wayne Community Development Club at the Bethel School Sept. 30 and Oct. 1.

Merchants in Waynesville and Canton have been very cooperative and several prizes have already been contributed.

The event will reflect every aspect of farming and farm home life. M. C. Nix, Bethel agriculture teacher who is directing the arrangements, said today in his announcement.

There will be exhibits of the Piedmont Valley's finest field crops, beef and dairy cattle, and home-making arts.

Cooperating are the Community groups of East and Center Pigeon, Cecil, and Cruso.

Associate director with Mr. Nix is Edwin Justice.

Working on committees which will handle the exhibits and the animals are the 64 members of the Bethel Future Farmers of America chapter and the 54 students taking agricultural training at Bethel under the GI Bill of Rights. In general charge will be George Stamey, Center Pigeon community officer.

Miss Betty Bradley, Bethel home economics teacher, will be in charge of the women's exhibits, assisted by her home economics students who are members of the local chapter of the Future Home Makers of America.

Besides the livestock and other farm shows, a full program of entertainment also is being planned for the visitors.

The night before the Fair opens, Assistant County Agent Turner Calvey announced recently, there will be an Amateur Night program.

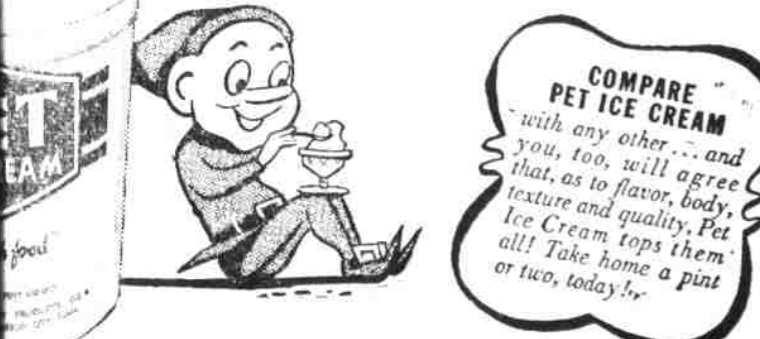
