One enterprising young housewife, Amzie Strickland, who combines being "Glad Friday" on "Call the Police" radio program with taking care of a growing son and a household, found that exercise could be employed with daily home chores. Farm Bureau Launches Drive For New Members

The Brannan farm bill will be fought to the bitter end, Jack Lynn, representative of the American Farm Bureau Federation, told Haywood audiences here this week. Mr. Lynn was the principal speaker at a series of meetings which launched a membership campaign for the Haywood unit of the Farm Bureau.

Charles B. McCrary, president of the Haywood unit, said that a minimum of 600 members was the goal, but "1,000 would be better." Mr. Lynn said, "The farm people are the last group to keep America from going socialist," as he solicited their cooperation for the plan.

won't work—it is not practical." The object of the plan, Mr. Lynn said, was to keep food costs down, and farm prices up, with controlled farm profits. The bill is apparently dead for this term, he said, but is sure to come up next year.

Mr. Lynn said that the Farm Bureau in North Carolina had placed too much emphasis on tobacco, when more attention should be given to boys and girls. Then he cited instances of where the bureau had played a part in aiding the youth of the country. A prize is being offered by the bureau to the community getting the largest number of members.
