

sues to be replaced by fat in various parts of the body. Many young mink die from the ailment, while survivors usually are left with inferior coats.

County Agent Wayne Corponing today urged Haywood County farm ers to start selecting their tobacco now for the Tobacco Show which will be held November 25 in Way nesville.


