Herbert Angel, chairman of the club's ticket sales committee, presented \$5 prizes to the East Waynesville school and Girl Scout Troop 6 as the award for winning the team contest in selling the greatest number of tickets.

The individual winners were guests of the club at the dinner meeting at the First Methodist Church, Calhoun Woodard of East Waynesville School, and all other salesmen, with a total of \$32.70 in ticket receipts.

Shirley Mae Cotnam and Mary Crouses of the team presented for first place in the competition among the members of the club, boys which took part in the advance sales campaign.

Each school group of 100 tickets to the show, consisting of 200 seats, sold for \$1.50, for a total of \$300.00.

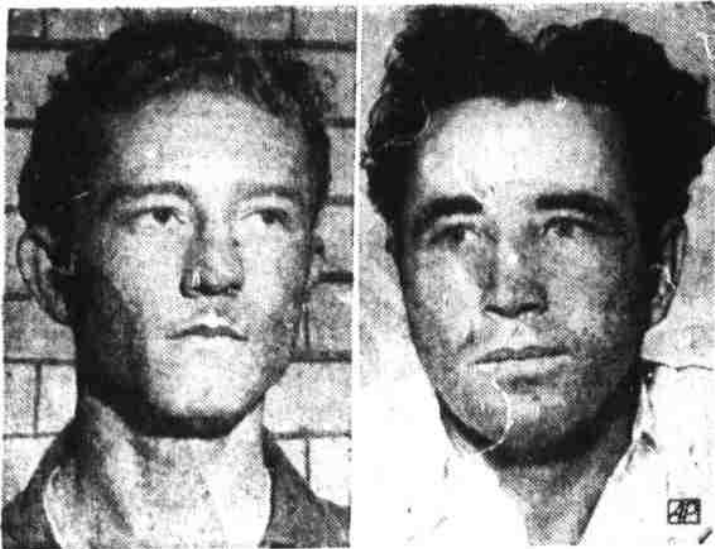

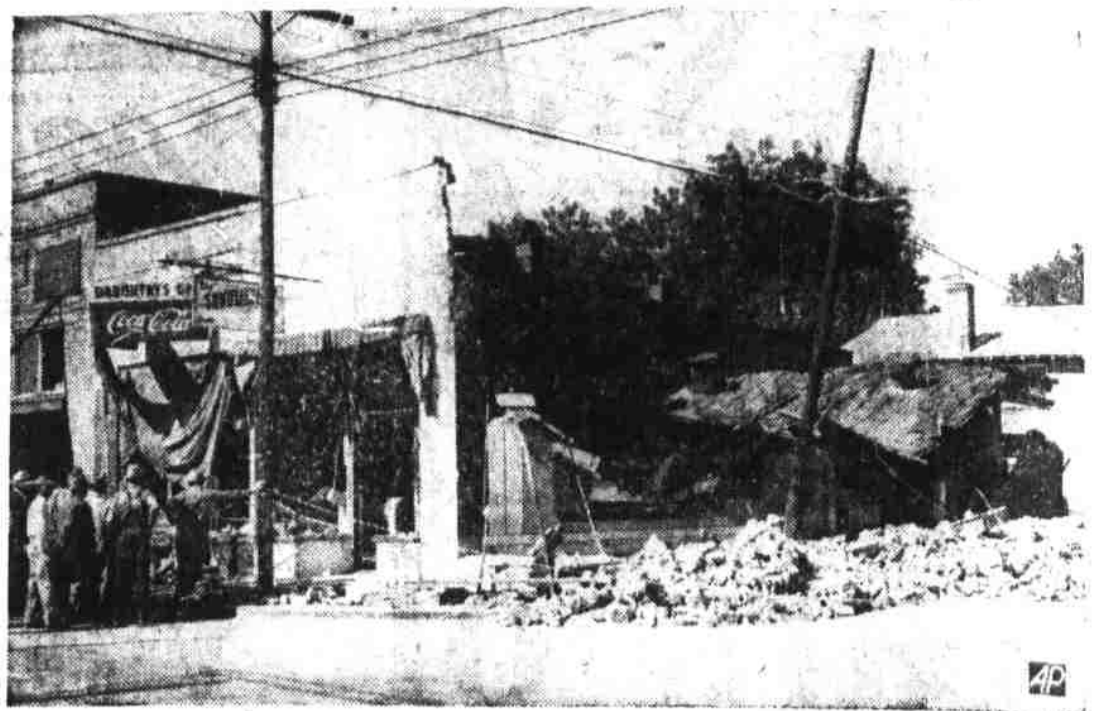
A. J. McCracken, a trustee of the church, accepted the memorial for the church.
