Changes Made In GI Training Procedures

John F. Williams, Veterans Administration training specialist for the Western North Carolina area, today reminded World War veterans of changes in procedures applicable to all schooling and training under the GI bill of rights. The new procedures went into effect on November 1. The most important of them are: 1. Veterans who have completed or discontinued a course and wish to take another course in a different general field will be required to undergo advisement and guidance. This will determine their aptitudes and needs for the new course. If the veterans clear advisement, they must obtain certificates of eligibility for a specific course and school before enrolling. 2. Each application for original and supplemental certificates must include the veteran's choice of course and name of the school in which he wants to take that course. Application must be made on new form 7-1950 (Sept. 1949). If the application is approved, the certificate will be good only for the specified course and school. The procedures are necessary under a new law which continues the ban on non-vocational and recreational courses. The new law also prohibits the VA from permitting veterans to enroll in a school which has been operating less than a year at the time the veteran enrolls. It also prohibits the VA from permitting veterans to enroll in a new course offered by a school outside the tax-supported classification which has not been conducted for the benefit of at least 25 students for one year prior to the veterans enrollment. Veterans wanting additional courses in the same general field as their original educational or job objective can enroll without advisement but only after VA has granted prior approval. If the veteran wants to continue his course in a different school, approval will be in the form of a certificate for the specific course in the school specified.

THE SCRIBNER RADIO MUSIC LIBRARY

Memorial Gift A complete set of the Scribner Radio Music Library has been presented to the library in memory of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Trantham by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Trantham of Chicago, who visited in Waynesville recently. The Scribner Radio Music Library is made up of nine volumes, each containing about 256 pages; six volumes being devoted to piano music, two volumes to songs, and one to both piano pieces and songs. There are in all 718 compositions, of which 492 are arranged for the piano and 316 for singing. We will first consider the volumes devoted to piano music, in order to obtain an idea of their musical content. VOLUME I, titled "Classic and Romantic Compositions," contains 75 choice compositions by celebrated composers of whom Bach, Beethoven, Chopin, and Liszt are representative. VOLUME II, titled "Modern Compositions," contains 61 selected works by noted modern and contemporary composers of whom Brahms, Debussy, Grieg, and Schubert are representative. VOLUME III, titled "Light Compositions," contains 67 works of lighter character by composers who have been unusually successful in this field, represented by Albéniz, Drigo, Fibich, and Langui. VOLUME IV, titled "Grand Opera Excerpts," contains 47 exquisite selections from famous classic and modern operas, the creations of Mozart, Rossini, Donizetti, Bizet, Humperdinck, Mascag-

Flying Classrooms Soon Ready For Students

SAN DIEGO (UP)—The first of the Air Force's new T-29 "flying classrooms" will be delivered about the first of October, officials of Consolidated Vultee Aircraft report. From the outside, the T-29 looks very much like the Convair-Tweener, 40-passenger, twin-engine commercial transport, with additional accommodations for navigational training. The first plane will not be fully equipped inside, however, and the first complete airplane will not be delivered until after the first of the year. The Air Force has ordered 36 of the instruction planes.
