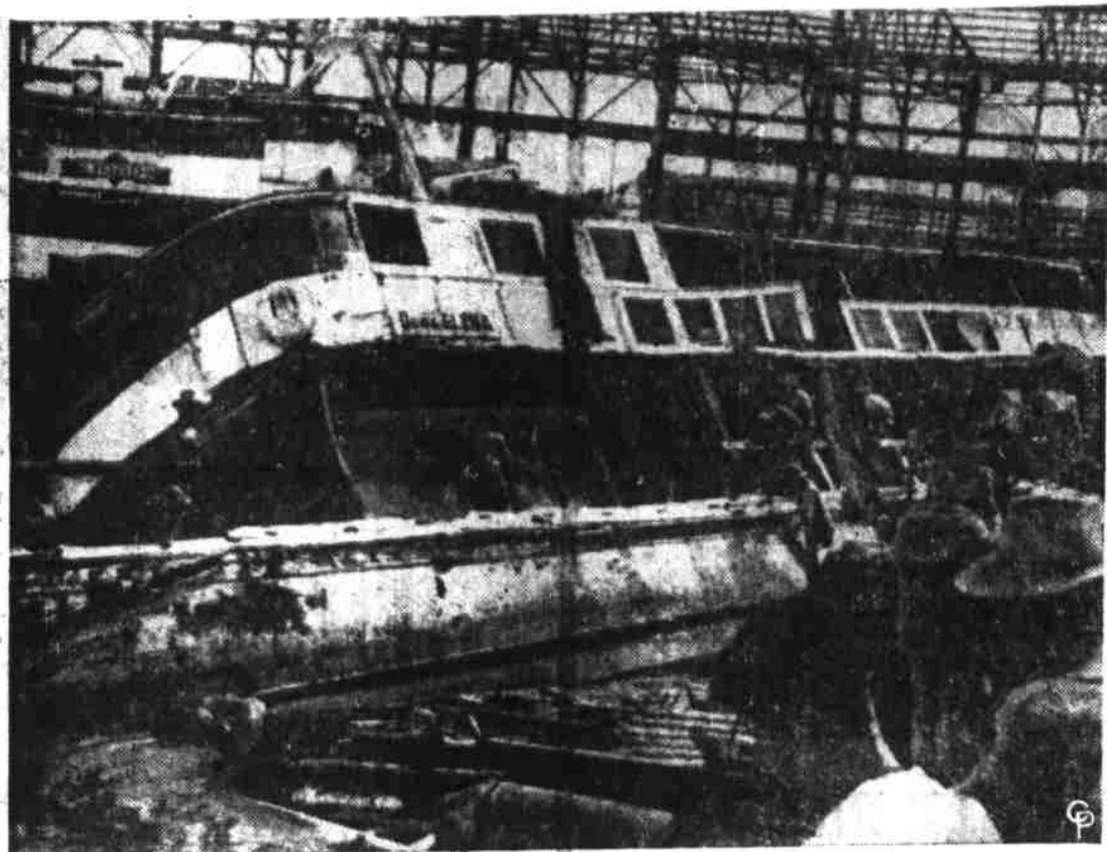
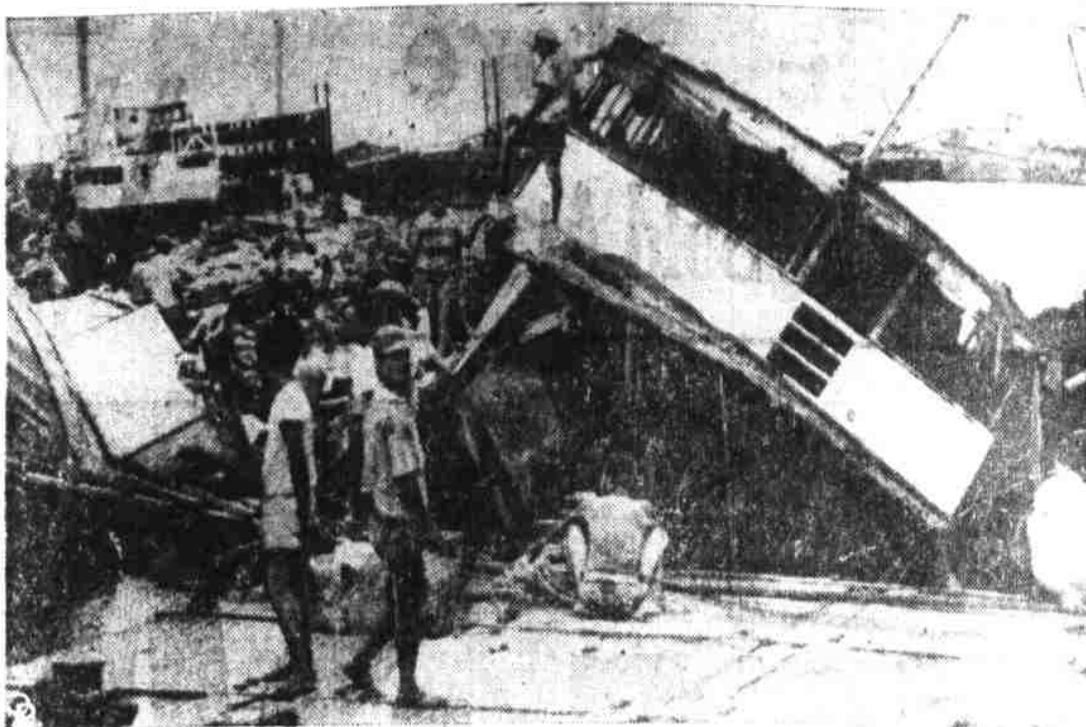


INTER-ISLAND BOAT SMASHED BY PHILIPPINE STORM
