No More Guesswork In Cooking Potatoes

ITHACA, N. Y. (UP)—Maybe the housewife will have to gripe no longer because potatoes fall apart when boiled or become hard as rocks when baked.

A new, accurate method of weight separation has been developed at the Cornell University agricultural experiment station to enable grocers to offer package potatoes for one of three specific purposes: boiling, frying or baking.

The method is the result of more than 10 years of research by Prof. Ora Smith. It involves the use of two tubs of salt water solution adjusted for density to the particular type of potato.

Mealy potatoes, best for baking, have the highest specific gravity and sink in the salt solution, Smith said, while the lighter boilers and fryers float.
