Black Mountain's Dark Horses and Bryson City's Maroons will meet in the first Smoky Mountain Bowl football game at Bryson City December 10.

Black Mountain will tangle with Sand Hill at Asheville Wednesday night in a playoff to decide the Buncombe County champion. The Dark Horses have lost only one game, a close decision to Oakley, this season, and shut out Sand Hill, 13-0, in a previous game.

Bryson City clinched the Smoky Mountain loop title and a bid as host team for the Bowl game by rolling over Franklin, 32-7, Friday night.

The Maroons have only a 20-6 deficit by Waynesville in a non-conference game, and a scoreless tie with Andrews in a conference contest on an otherwise perfect 1949 record.

The kickoff for the Bowl game, sponsored by the Bryson City Lions Club, is scheduled for 2 p.m.

The Bryson City midgeets and Cherokee Little Braves will stage a preliminary battle starting at 12:30 P.M.
