The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of imported Chantilly lace over white satin. The basque bodice featured a portrait neckline and was accented with a wide scalloped berth. The bouffant skirt fell in scallops over two tufts of net at the hemline. She wore matching lace mitts and carried an old-fashioned bouquet of valley lilies centered with white orchids.
