The actual donors are selected by physical examination.

Blood Donors To Be Enlisted By Lions Club Here

The Waynesville Lions Club, headed by President Dick Bradley, will try to get 100 volunteers lined up for the next visit of the American Red Cross Bloodmobile from the Asheville Regional Center.

Red Cross officials here said today that the Club had agreed to take the responsibility of enlisting the prospective donors.

The Bloodmobile's next visit—its fifth since last Spring—will be in January.

The specific date and the place the donor room will be set up will be announced later.

Meanwhile, Red Cross officials at the Asheville Center expressed concern over the level to which the blood reserves have fallen.

Last Friday, there were only eight pints on hand to take care of possible emergencies in the 17 Western North Carolina and four South Carolina counties the Center serves.

Officials said this would barely take care of a single serious emergency.

They planned to intensify their efforts during the next two weeks to build up a safe reserve of every different type of blood, in quantity.

Thirty volunteers living in and around Waynesville responded when the Bloodmobile visited the Waynesville Presbyterian Church last month.

According to the schedule, the Bloodmobile will come here every other month.

The party will continue through midnight, with a varied musical program scheduled.

The event is being held for the benefit of the church fund.

The public is welcome to attend.

Drivers License Office To Have New Schedule

State Drivers License Examiner W. W. Moore announced today his office would be closed Saturdays starting January 1.

The office in the basement of the Haywood County Court House has been open a half-day Saturday.

The change in schedule, however, is being made under the new system which calls for a five-day week for state offices.

The examiners' office in Waynesville is open Mondays, Thursdays, and Saturday mornings.

Mr. Moore also reminded motorists that the deadline for re-examination of licenses for those whose last names begin with L or M is Saturday, New Year's Eve.

The waiting room outside his office this morning was crowded with drivers in this category waiting to take their examinations.

Oldest Printed Page Shown in Museum

MAINZ, Germany (UP)—The oldest printed page in the world is kept in the Gutenberg Museum here.

Johann Gutenberg, inventor of the printing press, printed the first postcard size pages of the "Best Judgment" in 1445. Prof. Dr. Ruppel, director of the museum, estimated their value at 24,000 D-marks (about \$6,000).

The museum also contains the famous Gutenberg Bible, hand printed by Gutenberg from 1452 to 1455, which is the highest valued book in the world. It is valued at 1,000,000 D-marks (about \$240,000) and was exhibited in the Congressional Library in Washington, D. C.

Other famous books in the museum include "The Handwritten Bible of Charlemagne, the "Psalterium," which was finished by Gutenberg in 1459, and the illustrated history Bible of Dibold Labber, dating back to 1420.

B-29 Bomber Blisters Useful in Peace

SEATTLE, Wash. (UP)—At least one surplus item from World War II has adopted itself to all kinds of civilian uses.

Take the post-war life of a B-29 bomb blister, for instance.

Last winter, dozens of children used the big half-bowls to coast down the snow-covered first tee at the Broadmore Golf Course here.

Then some enterprising adults appropriated it for use as a punch bowl at various house parties.

In the fall, the Epiphany Church ladies took it over to serve as a "grab-bowl" for the children at a church bazaar.
