Book Briefs

By United Press The Custer Story, edited by Marguerite Merinton presents the letters and diaries of General Custer and his wife Libbie. Besides documenting an idyllic marriage, the papers tell the story of a turbulent period in American history. Miss Merinton was Libbie Custer's best friend and the general's widow turned over to her these personal papers with the request that they be published. Now, 17 years later, Devin-Adair has issued the volume. Staples Press has got out a \$1 tax manual to give quick answers to questions about income taxes. By means of thumb indexing, Key to Income Tax furnishes a welcome guide to income tax information for individuals and businesses. The book was prepared by a staff under the direction of George Stinson, former Justice Department attorney and legal assistant in U. S. Tax Court. Cash for Churchill Winston Churchill received a 1,000 lb. literary prize from the Sunday Times (London) for his war memories. The Times also awarded special gold medals to Alan Paton for Cry the Beloved Country and F. Spencer Chapman for The Jungle Is Neutral. Twenty years ago Christopher Reeves was popular as an author of thrilling mystery stories. He's back on the whodunit scene now with Lady, Be Careful, issued by Morrow. A novel entry in Simon & Schuster's spring book list is The Baby a book of 41 baby photographs with humorous captions, patterned after the hilarious photo book, The Frenchman. S & S have run off a first edition of 100,000 copies expecting big sales.
