Millions Spent Annually On Good Joker's Gadgets

NEW YORK—Oh, this'll fracture you. Laugh? You'll die. Seems there is a new—ho, ho, ho—a new gadget out. Looks like a real fountain—ha, ha, ha—like a real fountain pen. Only you take the top off and it—hee, hee, hee—it explodes! Imagine!

Then there is a new table knife. Looks exactly like any other table knife. But try to spread some butter with it. Just try and the darn thing will collapse! Honest, a real knee-stapper!

Can you stand it. Well, just one more. You hold what looks exactly like a pack of chewing gum. Matter of fact, there's a stick sticking out. Offer it to someone. He pulls on it. And water squirts out! All over his hand, his face. April Fool! April Fool! Yuh, yuh!

These are among the newest gadgets available for the practical jokers who will blossom out for this annual frolic. Richard Appel, one of the biggest manufacturers in the field, knows them well.

"Funny thing about the squirting chewing gum," he says. "For years everybody was making squirting gadgets. The ring which squirts, for example, is 60 years old. Also, lots of people made chewing gum which snaps or explodes. But nobody had thought to make squirting chewing gum until we brought it out. It's a big hit."

You will be glad, or dismayed, to learn that practical jokers are increasing, according to reports reaching Appel. "In time of trouble and tension," he theorizes, "people resort more and more to humor to forget."

Other Appel conclusions: Americans buy more practical jokes than anybody but sales are weakest in Maine and Vermont. Despite their reputation for being humorless, the British buy a lot of the gadgets when they have the dollars. Latin Americans are great practical jokers and, judging by sales over many years, the "Germans have the worst sense of humor, but there are sour pussies in every country."

Appel's business has been in his family for generations — in fact, since 1852. It operated from Germany until 1937 when, because of

Hitler, the firm was moved to this country.

Appel, who is graying, immaculate and rather serious, is the idea man. His guinea pigs are secretaries, tool makers and other people around his plant in lower Manhattan.

"My mind is working night and

day on the next gadget," he says. "I watch all of the new practical things, new tableware or pens or pencils that come out. I always think of them in terms of a practical joke."

"Our industry suffers from a lack of real creators. Too many people are thinking only of turning out old gadgets for less money. Thus, they sacrifice realism. But that's tragic. For in this business you have to imitate real things used in everyday life to such perfection that no one will be suspicious."

Among practical jokers, Appel reports, many of the old favorites are still going strong: the fake spilled bottle of ink ("at least 60 years old"); the leaky glass; matches which explode or sprout snakes; tiny pellets which, when placed on a lighted cigar, create synthetic snow (20 years old); a concealed tube which makes dishes jump; hot toothpicks (with pepper); candy, which, when unwrapped, jumps in all directions, throwing out springs and miscellaneous parts.

Teething powder; sneezing powder; soap which leaves a lather the color of blood; foaming sugar; exploding cigars, cigarettes and match boxes; a table spoon with a big hole in it; silverware which explodes and snaps; face cream jars which shoot, snap, explode or eject a snake; and, of course, the "hot seat" and the telescope which leaves the viewer with a black eye.
