28 Demonstrations Held On Pasture Renovation

Through the cooperation of the farm machinery dealers and others in Haywood county, a series of 28 demonstrations on the proper renovating and seeding of Ladino clover and orchard grass (or Pease) pasture have been held.

The following people have worked with the County Extension Service in putting on these demonstrations, in cooperation with the community organizations within the county: The Mountain Supply, operated by Rogers Brothers, who handle Ford tractors and Dearborn equipment; the Haywood Tractor and Implement Company, operated by Wallace Ward of Waynesville, who handles Ferguson tractors and Ferguson equipment; the Farmers Federation of Waynesville and Canton, who handle Oliver farm machinery and tractors; the Haywood County Farmers Cooperative, who furnished the Cyclone Seed-sower; Sims Tire and Battery Company, who furnished transportation and hauled equipment from demonstration to demonstration; the Waynesville Radio and Repair Shop, owned by E. J. Stannmeyer, who furnished the amplifying system for holding these demonstrations; and Francis & Wright Company of Hendersonville, who furnished a cultipacker-seeder and John-Deere equipment.

The chairmen of the community organizations within the county are to be congratulated on the work they have done in the promotion of Ladino clover in their communities, for without their help it would have been impossible to hold these demonstrations.

The officers of the Demonstration Farmers Organization in Haywood county met on Wednesday night, April 12, to make plans for the coming Out-of-State Farm Tour. These officers are: B. C. Francis, Ratcliffe Cove, chairman; T. C. Davis, Iron Duff; William Osborne, South Clyde; Van C. Wells, Pigeon; and George Stamey of Center Pigeon, who was last year's chairman. These officers met with the County Extension Workers, and set the date for this year's Out-of-State Tour to start on Monday, August 14 and end on August 19.

The general area which the tour will cover this year will be as follows: From Waynesville to Washington to the U. S. Beltsville Experiment Station in Maryland; then to the dairy and beef cattle section around Lancaster, Pennsylvania; New York City; then back down the coast into Delaware for the poultry and fruits and vegetables section; Atlantic City and Williamsburg; then down the coast back home.
