TOLLGATES FINANCE NEW HIGHWAYS

CHICAGO (UP) — More states are adopting the idea of financing new highway construction with collections at the tollgate instead of at the gasoline pump.

The American Public Works Association reports that in the 10 years since Connecticut and Pennsylvania opened their tollways, 12 other states have granted authority for toll-road construction.

Two others, California and Massachusetts, have set up special commissions to study the idea.

The association said nearly 300 miles of toll highways now are operated in Connecticut, Maine, New York and Pennsylvania.

An additional 132 miles of pay-as-you-ride roads are under construction in New Jersey and New Hampshire. While proposed toll turnpikes in other states would add 640 miles to the system.

Since 1946, toll roads have been authorized in Colorado, Georgia, Maryland, New Hampshire, New Jersey, North Carolina, Oklahoma and West Virginia. Before 1946, only Connecticut, Illinois, Maine, New York and Pennsylvania had permitted toll-road construction.
