Says Intangibles Cause Strikes
VANCOUVER — (AP)—Higher wages and shorter hours are not the real grounds for labor disputes, Dr. J. C. Hewson believes. He told the Engineering Institute of Canada here that the basic needs of workers are intangible.
"They get mad first, and then find something to strike about," Dr. Hewson, an industrial psychologist with a firm of management engineers, lists six basic needs for a man to be happy in his job that never come up for labor bargaining. These are affection, a sense of belonging and recognition, independence, social approval, self-respect and variety with occasional excitement.

Homes Will Be 'Quieter'

NEW YORK (UP)—Cabbage roses seem to be giving way to pastel daisies in home decorating schemes.

From several quarters come signs that things are quieting down, color-wise, in the home. A fabric company calls it "a preference for tranquil colors."

The chairman of the Jalore design competition, in awarding the fabric design first prize to a light, airy pattern said:

"The design contest points up the current preference for well-organized designs. The bold, splashy patterns of fabrics and wallpapers were left out of the prize selections."

Soft browns, coming into prominence in fashionable color schemes, seem to back up the subdued color theories. Another soft, grayed shade—plum—is picked as a coming favorite by Madelyn Smith, stylist for the Schulman Abrash fabric company.

Trend Awaited
It will take a few re-decorating seasons before this trend becomes apparent in the average home. The walls probably will be the first to show the change.

A paper called "antique rose" is typical of the new trend in flowered wallpaper, according to the United Wallpaper Co. A delicate pink rose is drawn against a background of miniature daisies. In the high fashion version, a charcoal-colored background is used. The tiny daisies in the background form an almost geometric pattern.

Textured and three-dimensional monotone designs are another new way to get a subdued wall background. The American artist Henry Billings designed four new three-dimensional patterns for the Schumacher Co., including a chicken wire design and a shadowed polka dot pattern.

Fabrics Copied
One group of textured papers in the United Wallpaper line has been adapted from hand-loomed fabrics designed by Dorothy Liebes.

A large plaid design, using red, green and black against a white background, is an identical copy of the original nubby fabric, even to stray glints of gold copied from the occasional metallic thread in the hand-loomed fabric.
