ville—so it is thought. The other unfortunate incident, was the blow-out of a tire of Miss Jean Childress' car as it was crossing the Potomac River bridge entering Washington Monday night. Other than a slight delay, no damage done.
The group were highly impressed with the farm lands between Baltimore and Lancaster, Pa., where Wednesday night was spent. ered the smaller body with leaves. The badly decomposed bodies of the two girls were found eight days later. Both had been ravished.
Shedd returned to his home after killing the small child, and when his wife asked where he had been, he replied: "To Clemson to try to get a job."
Solicitor Bryson said that tentative plans are for Shedd to go on trial in Macon County on Tuesday August 29. The criminal term opens there August 21, with Judge J. Will Pless, scheduled to preside. Solicitor Bryson said a special venire will be called for the case.
Shedd was brought here for safe keeping, and for transcribing the confession. Feeling ran high in Georgia soon after his arrest.
Sgt. Sandlin served the two warrants on Shedd just prior to the reading of the confession. The warrant charging him with the murder of Boyster was served in Georgia.
Shedd is married, and the oldest of eight children. His mother lives near Walhalla, S. C., where he owns a 15-acre farm which he bought after serving 18-months in the Navy. The defendant does not have any children. He said he finished the 2nd grade, but since the war had enrolled in a GI school and was now in fourth grade work. Judge Felix E. Alley was a wit-
