Decoration Day At Rocky Branch Cemetery Sunday

Residents of Allens Creek will meet at the Massie Cemetery Sunday to observe one of Haywood county's oldest traditions. This is the annual decoration of the graves in the burial ground, an event that has been held every year for more than 30 years.

Last year, in spite of the wet weather that cut the program short, 1,000 men, women and children gathered at the cemetery for the event.

This year's Decoration Day officials forecast a congregation at least as large, probably larger, provided the weather is fair.

Dinner will be held on the grounds, as has been the custom, and everyone is invited to attend.

The program will open with services at 11 o'clock at the Rocky Branch Baptist church, with the Rev. W. C. Weaver, the pastor preaching the sermon.

The members of the congregation will start decorating the graves at 11:45 a. m. and the picnic-style dinner will follow.

A number of singing groups will participate in the program.

Cherokee Drama Will Close On Labor Day Night

After establishing itself as America's outstanding outdoor attraction for 1950 in 35 performances and breaking new records each performance night of the remaining 18, the Cherokee Drama, "Unto These Hills", will close after the Labor Day night performance September 4.

The decision was announced today by board-chairman Harry E. Buchanan of Cherokee Historical Association after conference with Harry Davis, director, Carol White, general manager, and Cherokee Drama executive committee.

"Unto These Hills" definitely will play next year," Buchanan continued. "Acceptance by the American public has guaranteed that already. The 1951 opening may be earlier than July 1, as it was this year, and we may play longer. In the meantime, Mountaintop Theatre plant will be brought up to what we planned in the beginning—America's most spectacular and comfortable outdoor playhouse—and the seven-month program for its use by Great Smoky residents and the vacationing American public will be pushed immediately."

One hundred-ninety-two buses and 16,109 private cars from 45 states and 10 foreign countries have transported just over 60,000 patrons to see 35 performances of "Unto These Hills". A Drama of the Cherokees, now showing six nights each week (Tuesdays through Sundays) through Labor Day at Mountaintop Theatre, according to figures furnished by Carol White, general manager.
