DP Family Making Good In America

A Hungarian couple is proving that America is still the Land of Opportunity—if you work at it.

Mr. and Mrs. Zoltan Szentivanyi came to Western North Carolina with their two children, Zoli, 3 and Catherine, 8, 15 months ago from a Displaced Persons Camp. Mr. Szentivanyi found a job in Bryson City.

But the salary of \$26 a week was not quite enough to support his family.

At the same time, his training and educational background were going to waste.

But a few months ago, he found help in an unexpected source.

At the Welco Shoe Corporation plant here, Andrew Szerenyi has been working for years as plant engineer and as official in charge of plant supplies and machinery.

Mr. Szerenyi himself was born in Hungary, and migrated to Canada 25 years ago.

Hearing of the Szentivanyis' plight, he immediately contacted the Welco management.

Welco engaged Mr. Szentivanyi as a bookkeeper.

That was a big jump from the manual labor job which had barely supported the family for a year.

Then the Hungarian's 37-year-old wife started looking around for night work to help her family even more.

And when her search for that sort of a job failed, she rented a two-story home in Hazelwood, and opened up a day nursery and kindergarten.

Both Szentivanyis are pretty well qualified for their jobs.

The 43-year-old head of the family at the time of the Nazi invasion of his home country was supervisor of the Hungarian National Bank in Budapest.

He holds the university degrees of doctor of economics, law, and agriculture.

He's also a Certified Public Accountant who speaks German, Spanish, Italian, French and Serbian, as well as his native tongue, fluently, and now can speak English almost as well, though he didn't know a word of the language when he first reached the United States.

Radio Series To Tell About N.C. Begins On Friday

How rich is North Carolina and how much money is lost each year needlessly by waste and not putting our resources to work are answered in the first of a series of Radio Programs started this week on Station WHCC according to Jack Messer, Superintendent of Schools and Chairman of the County Radio Committee. Other members of the Committee which is sponsoring the Series are Bob Hall, Wayne Corpening, Charles W. Ormond, Mrs. J. C. Jennings, Mrs. Sam Queen, R. E. Caldwell, Stanley Livingston, Tom Campbell, M. I. Bosels, Dr. Irvin M. Weir, Alice Brown, and Lucy Jones.

These Committeemen represent the seven State Agencies in the North Carolina Resource-Use Education Commission which produced the programs for use of all the radio stations in North Carolina. They are the Department of Public Instruction, Department of Labor, Department of Agriculture, State Board of Public Welfare, State Board of Health, North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission and the Department of Conservation and Development.

The title of the Series as well as the first program is The Silent Siren, to indicate that there is no warning that we are losing \$1,705,424,000 dollars a year suffering needless illness and disease and failing to realize full productivity of our human, natural and social resources of the State.

As Dr. Clyde A. Erwin, State Superintendent of Public Instruction and Chairman of the Commission points out in the first of the programs "we are a rich State and the possibilities for progress are almost unlimited. We have the information and know-how available to put these resources to use. We feel that the programs in this series of thirteen will bring you much useful and interesting information."

The Series has been produced at the Communication Center at Chapel Hill under the direction of Robert F. Schenck and Dr. Richard L. Weaver, written by John Clayton and directed by John Young. The series begins this week at 6:15 Friday, Sept. 29th.

There will be one program each week at the same time until the week of December 17-23.

Hungarian patriots sent into action to protect their resources from the looting they knew would follow the occupation.

Mr. Szentivanyi's work was so vigorous that the Nazis labelled him as one of the Gold Robbers.

He helped smuggle out of his country 56 wagonloads carrying 36 tons of gold, two wagonloads of silver, and \$300,000,000 worth of bonds in January 1945.

The Nazis intercepted a trainload of this wealth, but the bulk of it escaped confiscation and was hidden in a 900-year-old Monastery until the war ended.

The U. S. Military Government returned it to Hungary after the Germans were defeated.

Mrs. Szentivanyi, a Hungarian Red Cross nurse, gained years of experience in social work before the war, specializing in the care and placement of homeless children.

During the war, she worked in the Hungarian Red Cross Children's hospital.

After the liberation of their homeland, the Szentivanyis didn't just wait for someone to send them home from the DP camp.

Mr. Szentivanyi worked as administrator of the camp's general hospital and with the children's tuberculosis children.

Mrs. Szentivanyi served as the hospital's dietician and supervisor of the children's wards.

For her nursery she is accepting children from two to six years of age, and takes care of them from 8 in the morning until 4 in the afternoon while their mothers are working.

The name Szentivanyi, appropriately enough, is the Hungarian word for St. John. It was St. John's Church of Waynesville which arranged for the family to be admitted to the United States.

The Szentivanyis can tell you about life in Hungary if you ask them.

But ordinarily they are too busy proving that all it takes is work to realize America is still the Land of Opportunity.

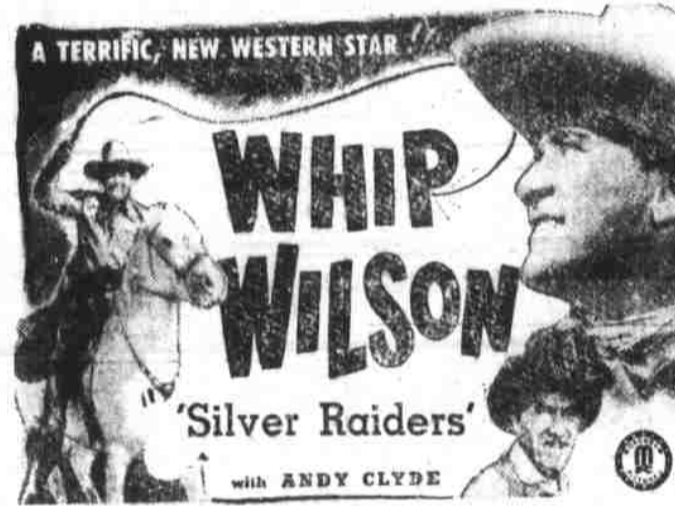
