Nearly 600 New Enterprises In CP&L Territory

Since the beginning of 1946—first full year after World War II—nearly 600 new enterprises have located in the territory served by Carolina Power & Light Company, according to W. Paul Lyman, CP&L industrial sales manager. Of the new enterprises, 69 were added so far in 1950, but these 69 will account for more than a third of the increase in power usage represented by all new industries. Lyman explained that the 317 added during the four years preceding 1950 included many smaller plants, such as concrete block plants and freezer lockers which began operating soon after the war. On the other hand, industrial customers added in 1950 include several large concerns, such as the Robbins Mill at Aberdeen and the duPont plant near Camden, South Carolina.

7 Local Students Attending Meredith

The estimated 600 students which Meredith College officials predicted for the 1950-51 semester just beginning has proven to be exactly 612 including regular and special (part-time) students, according to official figures released by Mrs. Vera Tart Marsh, College Registrar. This is an increase of 56 over the 556 students enrolled in 1949-50.

The student body represents 74 North Carolina counties 13 other states and the District of Columbia and six foreign countries and territories outside continental United States including China, Cuba, Costa Rica, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and Palestine.

Smokers Top List Of Blaze Starters

NEW YORK—Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 8-14, finds that familiar, though unintentional, menace—the careless smoker—at the top of a list of 24 causes of fires in the nation.

Recent statistics released by the National Fire Protection Association make it clear that the householder who dashes back into the kitchen to check on the range burners before leaving home would do better to examine the ashtrays.

Electrical-fixed services rank second in the NFPA list, and "unknown," third. Defective heating equipment and faulty fuses are fourth and fifth, respectively, and sparks on the roof and lightning follow in rating.

Matches are just as much a fire hazard as they always have been, in spite of years of fire prevention campaigns. The sulphur-tipped devices rank along with smoking in first place as a fire cause (more than 16 per cent of all fires) and reappear in tenth place in connection with children's blaze-setting.

Bringing up the rear are gas and gas equipment in 23rd place, and sparks from machinery, 24th.

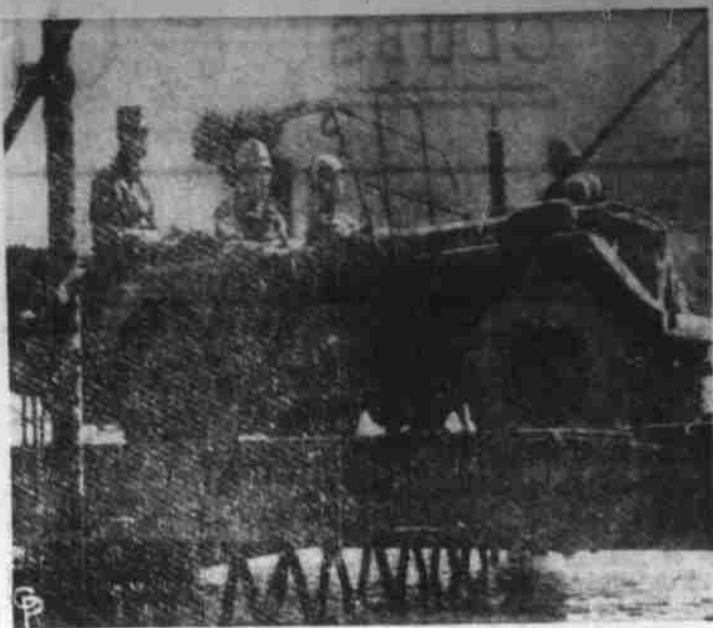
When it comes to dollar loss, "unknown" is in first place, with 29 per cent. Explosions are second with 11 per cent. Electrical-fixed services and defective heating are tied for third, while smoking and matches are next.

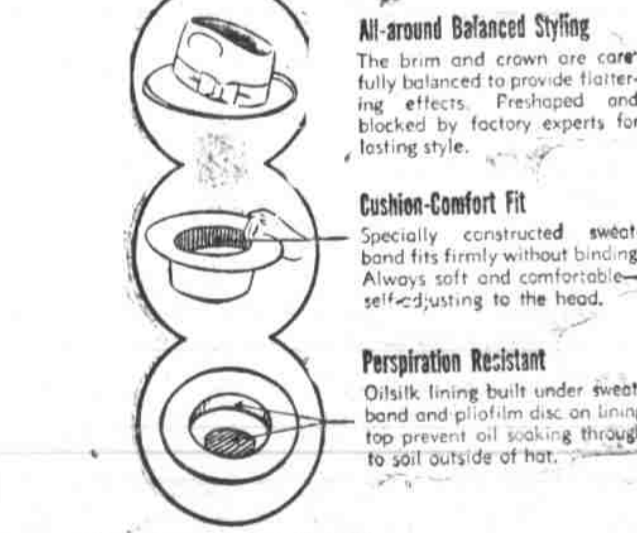
