said that poetry doesn't, sometimes, run into big money?

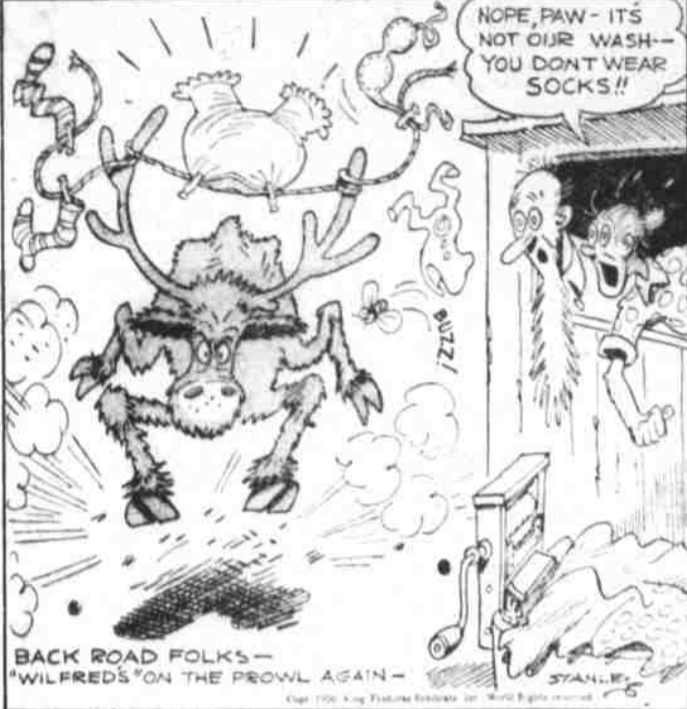
The past seems more glamorous than the present when you remember that Cleopatra, not Farouk, was once boss of Egypt.

But Cleo, like Farouk, was a pretty good spender. She once put a pearl instead of an olive in her cocktail.

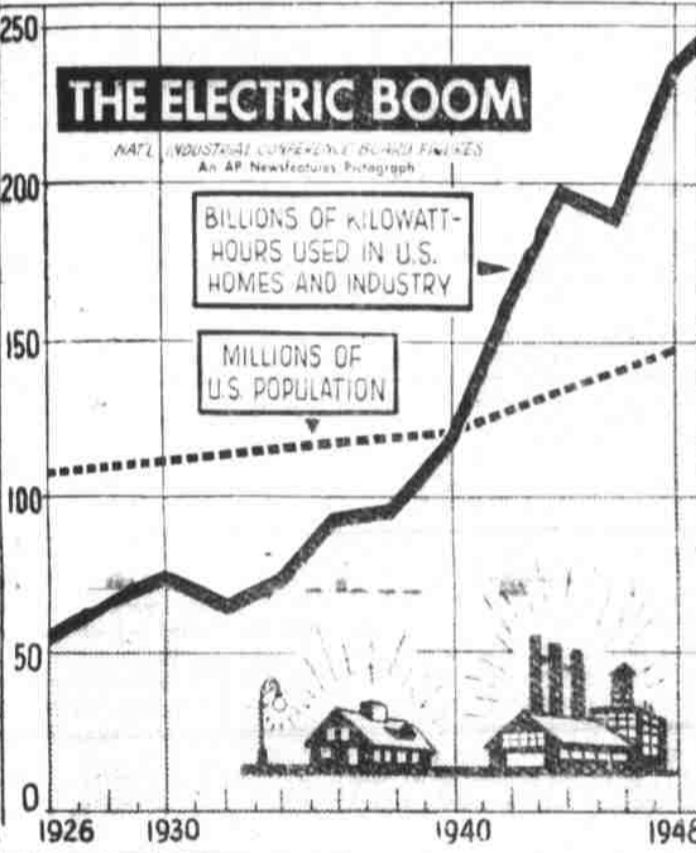

20 Bear Hunts Set for Sherwood

Twenty bear hunts — twice as many as last season — have been scheduled for the Sherwood Wildlife Management Area in Haywood County this season.

In response to popular demand, the State Wildlife Resources Commission last week added ten extra two-day hunts to the normal schedule.

The season will open October 15, and the last hunt is scheduled to start November 18.

Hunts will be held simultaneously during that period in the West Fork and the Big East Fork sections.

Eugene E. Schwall, chief of the Wildlife Resources Commission's game division, notified local sportsmen of the assignment of extra hunts in a letter received a few days ago.

Drawings for the regular hunts were held September 25 at Asheville.
