## Sunday School Lessons

### How to Grow Through Prayer

JESUS TAUGHT US TO PRAY IN SECRET TO GOD, OUR FATHER.

Scripture—Matthew 6:5-15; Luke 11:1-13; Philippians 1:3-11; Colossians 4:2-4.

SOMEONE in World War II said, "There are no atheists in fox holes." When men are desperately in need of help, with no man near to give it, even the slightest and least believing is given to call upon his Maker.  
It is true also of those who have experienced the terrors of war, persecution or other dangers. When troubles come, nearly all of us resort to prayer. Why is it, then, that so many of us forget to pray daily? When the sun shines for us, we apparently forget God—using our Father in heaven as a last resort when disaster strikes.  
We wouldn't treat a human friend that way, would we? Why, then, do we act so to God?  
At the beginning of Jesus' mission, He taught His disciples how they should pray, and His words were intended for all Christians everywhere. His words on this subject occur in the Sermon on the Mount.  
"And when thou prayest, thou shalt not be as the hypocrites are: for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners of the streets, that they may be seen of men. Verily I say unto you, They have their reward."  
Are there such people in the world today? Possibly—even ministers of God—good men—who grow so enamored of the words that flow so eloquently from their lips that they forget Jesus' commands, and pray "that they be seen of men." They get their reward, as Jesus said. People tell them how beautiful their prayers are, but are such prayers likely to be heard and answered as are those which are the outpourings of a soul asking help to live as our Father wishes us to live, or to receive strength to bear some great sorrow?  
"But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly."  
Then the Lord told them how to pray, simply, reverently, to the Father of us all:  
"Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name: Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven.  
"Give us this day our daily bread."

Just as simply and naturally as that—even asking that we may have food to sustain our bodies while we are on earth.  
"Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors." Can we indeed forgive those who hurt us? If not, why should we expect God to forgive us our sins?  
Jesus told a parable then about a man who had unexpected guests. He went to a friend's house—although it was midnight—and knocked.  
The friend answered, but when the man said he wanted bread, the friend said all his household were in bed for the night, and he couldn't supply the need.  
The man knocked again and again, and his friend rose up and gave him what he asked for.
