Funeral services were held in Grace Episcopal church this morning for Miss Katharine M. Reed, 70, who died in her home here Tuesday night following a heart attack.

Miss Reed came to Waynesville to make her home in 1945, following her retirement as professor of French at the University of Akron, Ohio. She had spent the summers here for many years prior to that time.

She was a native of New Orleans,

Louisiana and a graduate of Sophie Newcomb College there. At the outbreak of World War I while chaperoning a group of college girls in Europe, she managed to get the girls safely out of Paris and back to the States, although their luggage had to be abandoned.

After coming to Waynesville to live, Miss Reed took an active part in the affairs of Grace Episcopal church, of which she was a member, and of Richland Garden Club, which she served as secretary until the time of her death. Her gentle manner and neighborliness had endeared her to a host of friends.

Surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Marcellus Whaley of Columbia, S. C., and Miss Evelyn C. Reed of Waynesville; and one brother, Lyman C. Reed of Waynesville.

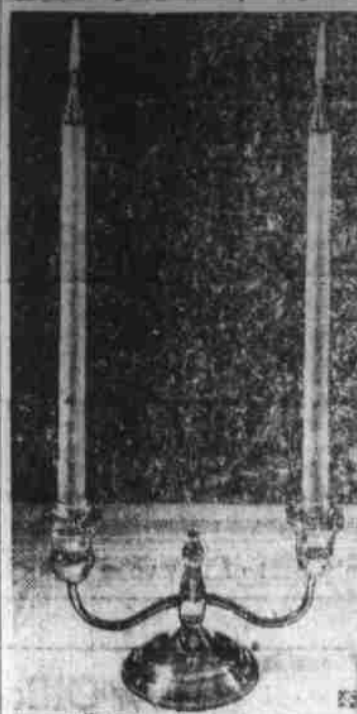

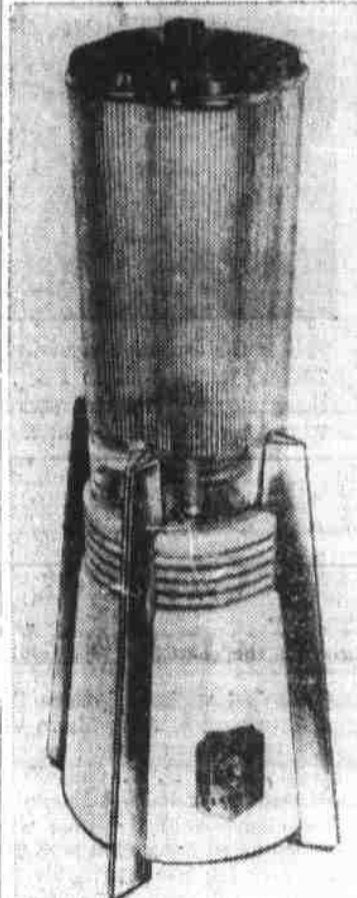
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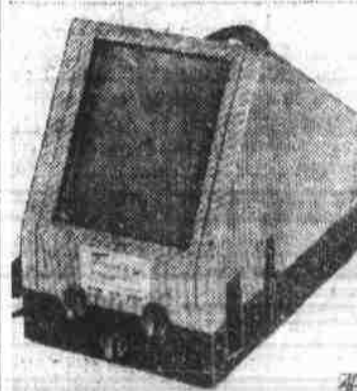


TABLE VIEWER . . . Portable unit for viewing stereo slides at home.

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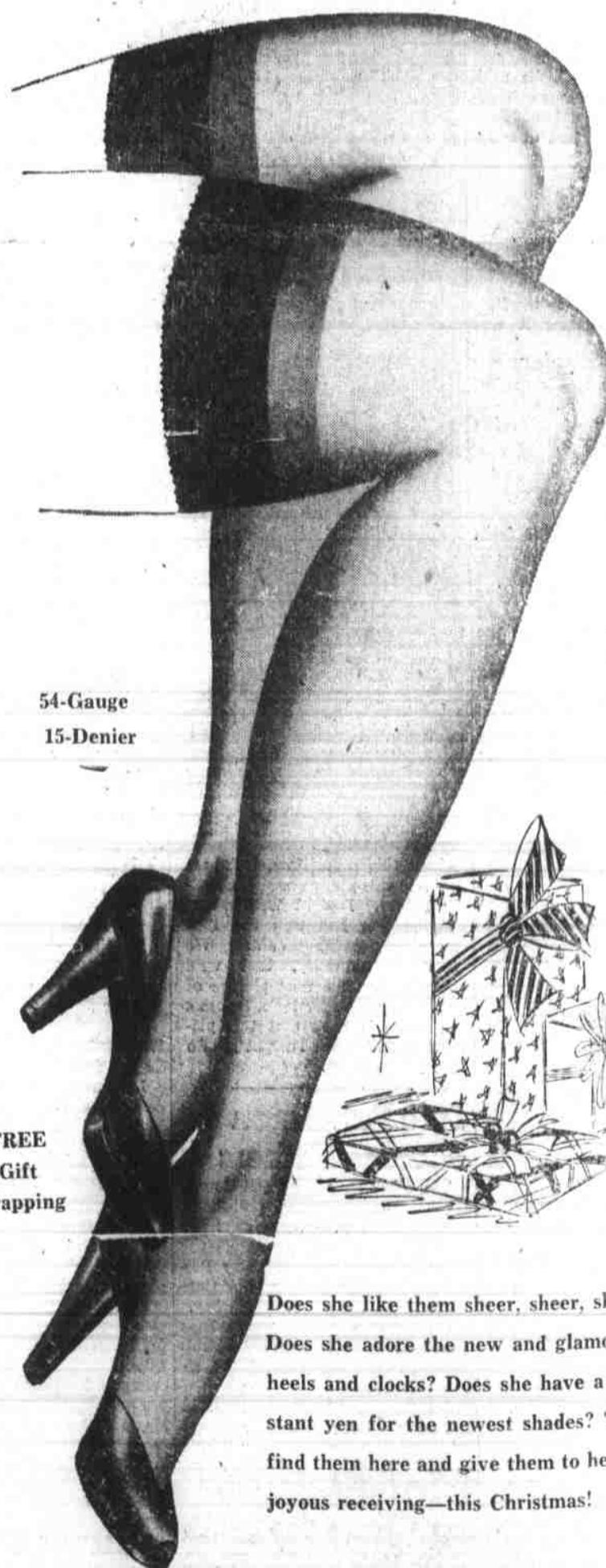
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
