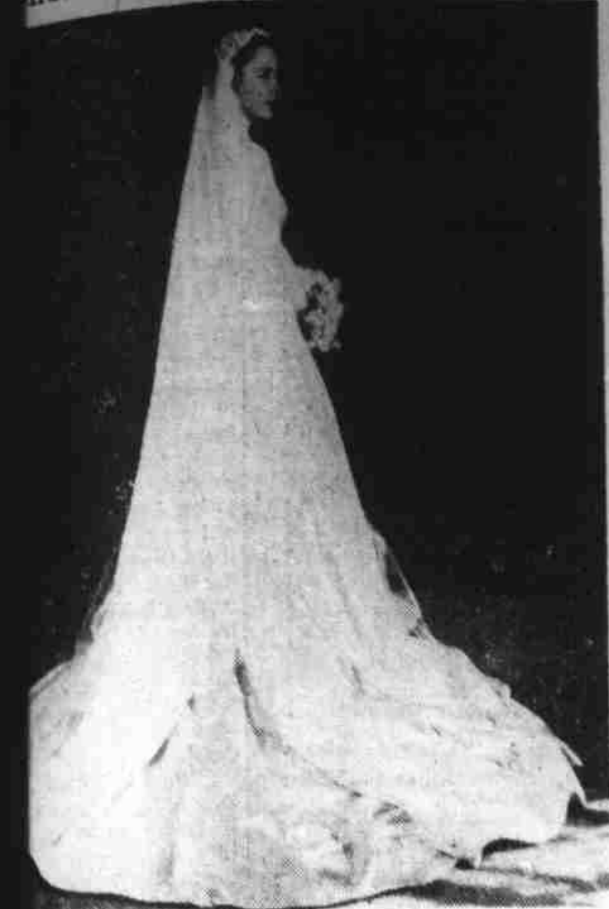


Mrs. Lemuel Hardy Gibbons
