Presentation of chicks to 4-H members who will participate in the 4-H Club Poultry Chain in Haywood County this year took place Thursday afternoon at the Farmers Federation in Waynesville. The chicks were presented by Roger Ammons, local manager, with the assistance of Don Biggerstaff of the Asheville office.

The Federation, in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Service, sponsors a Pulley Chain in which a hundred NC-US Certified chicks are given to ten selected 4-H members in this county.

These ten members are the winners of an essay contest on "Why I Think the Hatching Egg Industry Should Be Increased in Haywood County." Each member agrees to feed and care for his or her chicks according to the recommendations of the Extension Service. In the fall they will enter 12 choice pullets in a Poultry Show sponsored by the Federation. After competing for prizes, these pullets will be auctioned off. The cash received from their sale will go into a 4-H Poultry Fund and will be used to start another group of 4-H members in this project next year.

should be financially responsible for any damage they do—and the only way I know of to make sure of that is liability insurance.

"There is a law, but I think it should be stricter. Under the present North Carolina law a person whose car is damaged more than \$50 worth may be able to obtain a Court judgment against the other driver, whose driver's license and automobile registration are taken away from him until he pays the amount ordered. But that still does not guarantee payment of the repair bills of the innocent driver."

Rev. B. E. Wall Heard By Rotary Club On Friday

Rotarians heard Rev. Broadus E. Wall discuss seven "Social Evils of Our Day" at their regular meeting here Friday.

The pastor of the First Baptist church pointed out the need of more "manpower for advancing God's Kingdom."

He listed the seven evils, and discussed each briefly, as follows:

- 1—Politics without principle—the danger of putting party before moral principles.
- 2—Wealth without work.
- 3—Pleasure without conscience.
- 4—Knowledge without character.
- 5—Industry without morality.
- 6—Science without humanity—science and religion go hand-in-hand, on common ground.
- 7—Worship without sacrifice—we need more than just lip service.

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
