HOLLYWOOD—Margaret Truman smiled and smiled. She didn't say a lot. But she sure charmed the hardboiled ladies and gentlemen of the Hollywood press at her mass news conference the other day.

"She gives the impression of being very good-looking," a seasoned legman confided afterward. "I wouldn't mind dating her." Other comments included: "Very nice" and "handles herself very well"
