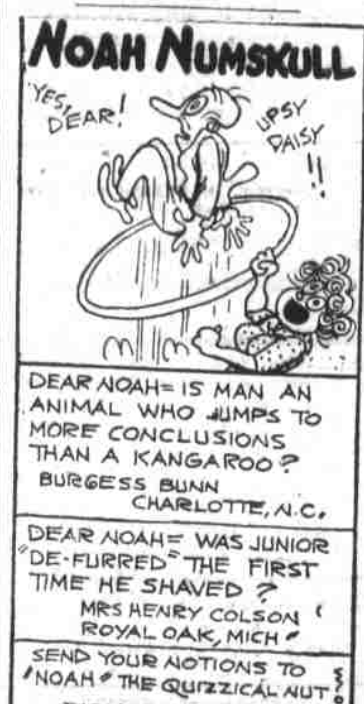
Sore, Tired Feet Costs Industry \$100,000,000

By JANE EADS, AP Newsfeatures Writer. WASHINGTON—The nation is being urged to concentrate on better understanding of feet. The National Foot Health Council is sponsoring its 26th annual week, May 19-26 on foot care. Dr. Joseph Lelyveld, chairman and founder of the council, says this year's week will especially point up foot care for men and women employed in defense plants and for those in the armed services. The council's program, he says, is also directed to school children with advice on the selection of footwear to prevent foot defects and deformities.
