## Child Welfare Work To Be Described By County Case Worker

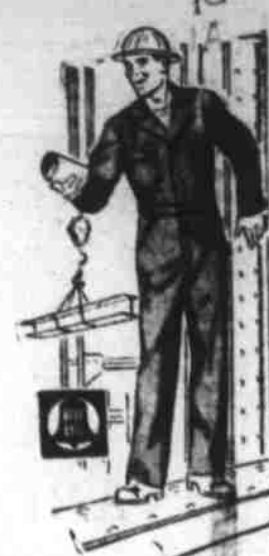
Two rapidly developing plans for caring for children who must be removed from their own homes will be described over Station WHCC on Friday evening at 7:20 p.m. when the station, in cooperation with the Haywood County Department of Public Welfare, presents the third program in the current series, "It's Your Welfare." This week's program, entitled "Building for the Future," will concern adoptions and the program of boarding homes for children that is developing in North Carolina.

How adoptive and boarding home placements are carried out, what safeguards are thrown around them, and why some parents give up their children, either temporarily or permanently, will be discussed by Mrs. Jack Klopp, Child Welfare Case Worker.

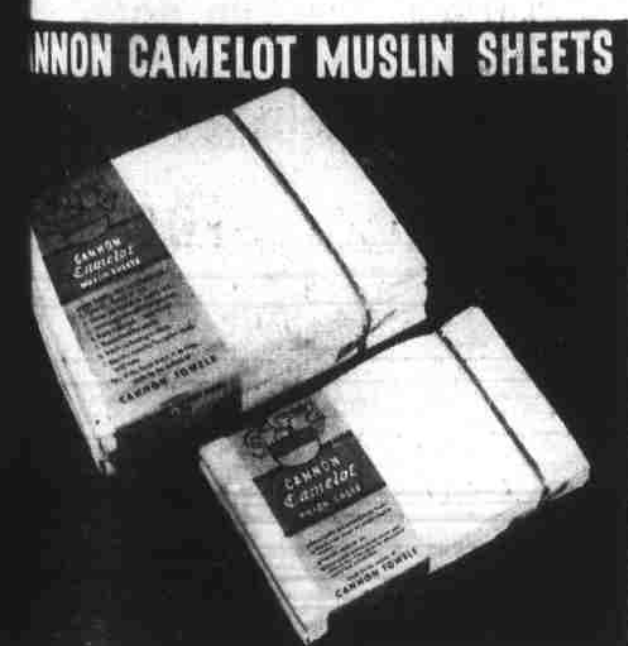
