Sgt. Lovie Jones Wins Silver Star

Sgt. Lovie W. Jones of Canton has been awarded the Silver Star medal for gallantry in action in Korea.

On August 31, 1950, a strong enemy force attacked the positions of a Republic of Korea company, near Kanan. Jones, attached to the company as an 81-mm mortar forward observer, remained in an exposed position and directed accurate mortar fire on the enemy until his position was nearly overrun.

Jones assisted his radio operator, who had been seriously wounded, through a deadly hail of enemy small-arms and mortar fire to the positions of the company.

After obtaining aid for the wounded man, Jones reorganized the ROK troops and placed them in positions from which they successfully repelled repeated enemy attacks until reinforcements arrived at daylight.

Jones is a member of Company D, 35th Infantry Regiment.
