Special Events Slated For Lake This Week-End

Rounding out the first week of the 1951 season, the Lake Junaluska Assembly program this week-end will feature special events at Shackford Hall and the Auditorium.
 Meeting at Shackford Hall are 300 college students and Methodist youth directors of the southeast and Ohio, attending the annual student regional conference. The meeting opened Tuesday and will close Monday.
 The Rev. Howard Ellis, associate director of public evangelism at the Methodist Board of Evangelism, Nashville, Tenn., will be the chief speaker Friday night at the student conference. Speaking on "The Gospel in Arts," his address will be illustrated by two religious films, "Second Chance" and "Again Pioneers."
 Dr. Allan Knight Chalmers, professor at Boston University School of Theology, will conclude his series of four addresses Saturday morning. As principal platform speaker, he has challenged the youth delegates daily to "take a stand for what you believe is right in Christian social action." Subject theme of his inspirational messages is "A Stubborn Faith for a Tough Age." For 25 years Dr. Chalmers was pastor of the famous Broadway Tabernacle in New York City. Though invited repeatedly, this is the first time he has been able to appear at the Assembly.
 A drama, "What Men Live By," will be presented Saturday night at the conference by the Wesley Players of Eastern Carolina Teachers College, Greenville, directed by Miss Mamie Chandler.
 In addition to the regular conference workshop program Sunday, Dr. John O. Gross, Nashville, Tenn., will give the morning address and conduct Holy Communion and commitment service for the students. He is executive secretary of the Methodist Board of Education's al-

Camp Adventure To Open Monday At Junaluska

Camp Adventure, acquired last fall by the Lake Junaluska Methodist Assembly, will open Monday as a youth camp for church groups of the southeast, according to Dr. H. G. Allen, Assembly Superintendent.
 The Assembly will not operate the camp, but rent its facilities to churches and other groups. Dr. Allen said. Located on U. S. Highway 19 at the western end of the Assembly grounds, the camp comprises sports fields, a mess hall, a recreation and assembly building, and 25 rustic cabins that will accommodate 175 guests. Facilities have been improved and considerable new equipment has been installed, Dr. Allen said.
 Youth groups from the Myers Park and Dilworth Methodist churches, Charlotte, will occupy the camp June 11-24. A third, Charlotte group, Hawthorne Lane Church, will move in June 25, followed by youth of Kingstree, S. C., July 2-9; Lenoir First Church, July 9-16; Lexington First Church and Thomasville Church, July 16-23; Buncombe Street Church of Greenville, July 24-30; four Winston-Salem churches—Centenary, Ardmore, Burkhead and Trinity—July 30-August 6; Charlotte First Church, August 6-13; and Central Church of Florence, S. C., August 13-20.
 Campers will have access to Lake Junaluska swimming and boating facilities, using the overhead bridge that spans the highway.
 The Assembly also has acquired the old Putnam residence on Lakeshore Drive and is converting the dwelling into a guest lodge.
 The second unit of the Lake Junaluska Assembly is the division of educational institutions.
 Dr. Edgar H. Nease, Methodist district superintendent at Charlotte, will preach twice Sunday at the Auditorium, 11 a.m. and 8 p.m. The public is invited.
 The 8 p.m. movie program the rest of this week at the Auditorium will feature "Shubert, the Melody Man" tonight, "The Pied Piper" Friday, and "The Phantom of the Opera" Saturday.
