project—we have waited 30 years, and that is all we are asking—the road we are entitled to get," he continued.

The story appearing in the Saturday issue of The Times-News, Hendersonville, is as follows:

Henderson county was credited in press dispatches today with having joined Buncombe and Madison counties to fight for the long-dreamed-of French Broad River Valley superhighway, but L. B. Prince, president of the Hendersonville Chamber of Commerce, said this morning that "our interest in retaining, maintaining and improving U. S. Highway No. 25 does not imply that we are opposing the construction of improved highways anywhere in Western North Carolina."

Reference was made to efforts of Waynesville and other towns to obtain a through highway to the Tennessee line via Pigeon River Valley, from Clyde to a point near Hot Springs. Haywood counties have emphasized the advantages

of such a highway to the extent that a public meeting was held in Marshall Friday night to "fight" for the French Broad route. Attending from Hendersonville were P. M. Camak, of the Chamber of Commerce; I. E. Johnson, county chairman of the Western North Carolina Tourist Association, and R. A. Kirkland, tourist court operator and member of U. S. Highway 25 Association.

Mr. Camak told the group of about 150 persons that no official action on the "controversy" has been taken here, but that in view of investments on Highway 25 and its value as a tourist artery "we are interested in seeing that it does not lose its identity but is further developed and improved."

Mr. Prince said the Chamber of Commerce is not opposing the construction of any road, including the Pigeon River route, "unless it appears that such a route would take over the functions of U. S. 25 through Marshall and Asheville."

The meeting at Marshall voted to invite L. Dale Thrash, 10th highway division commissioner, to attend another meeting in Bun-

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the highway patrol out of Asheville, headed by Sgt. E. W. Jones.

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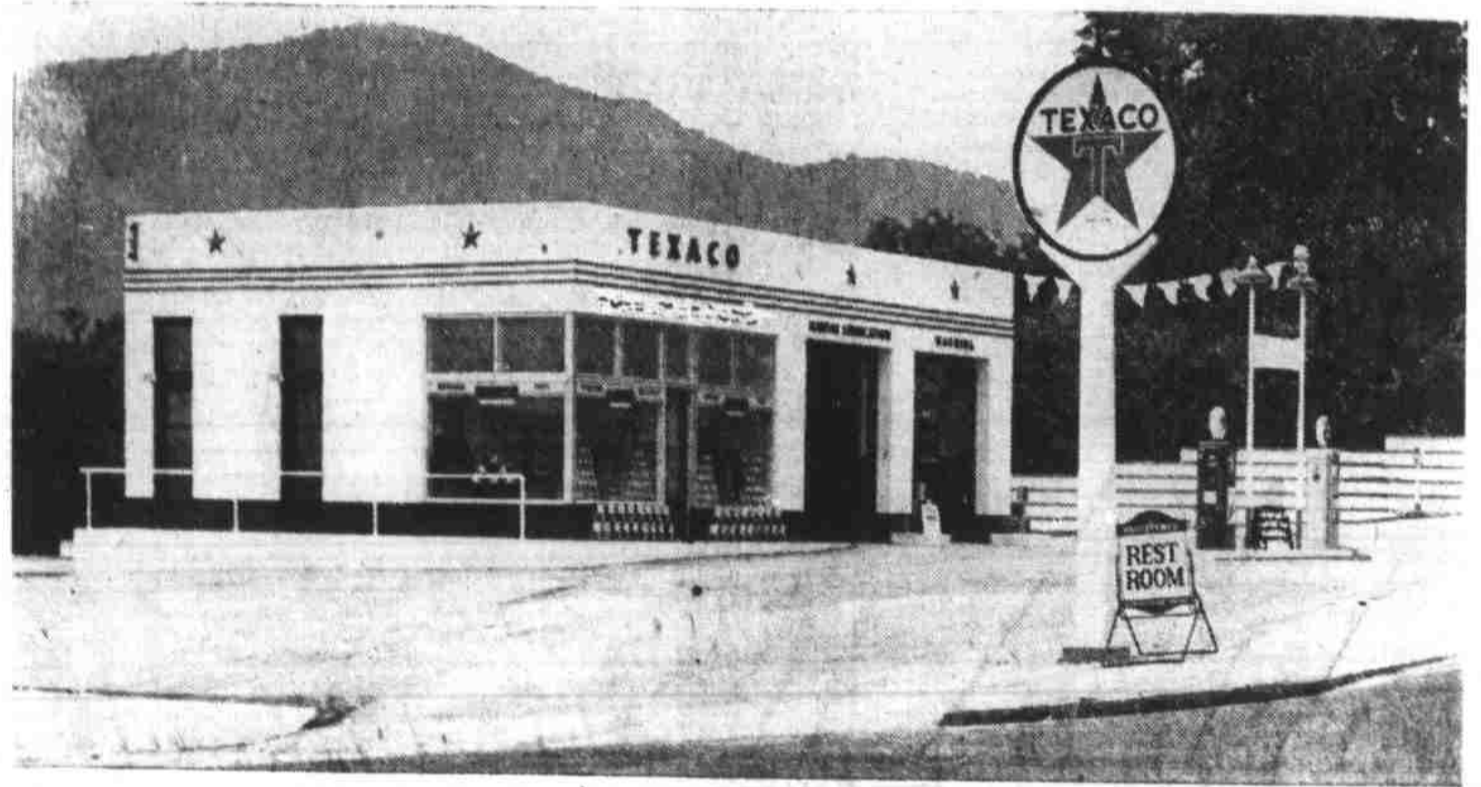
