Hominy Women Carry On Progressive Program For Improving Their Homes

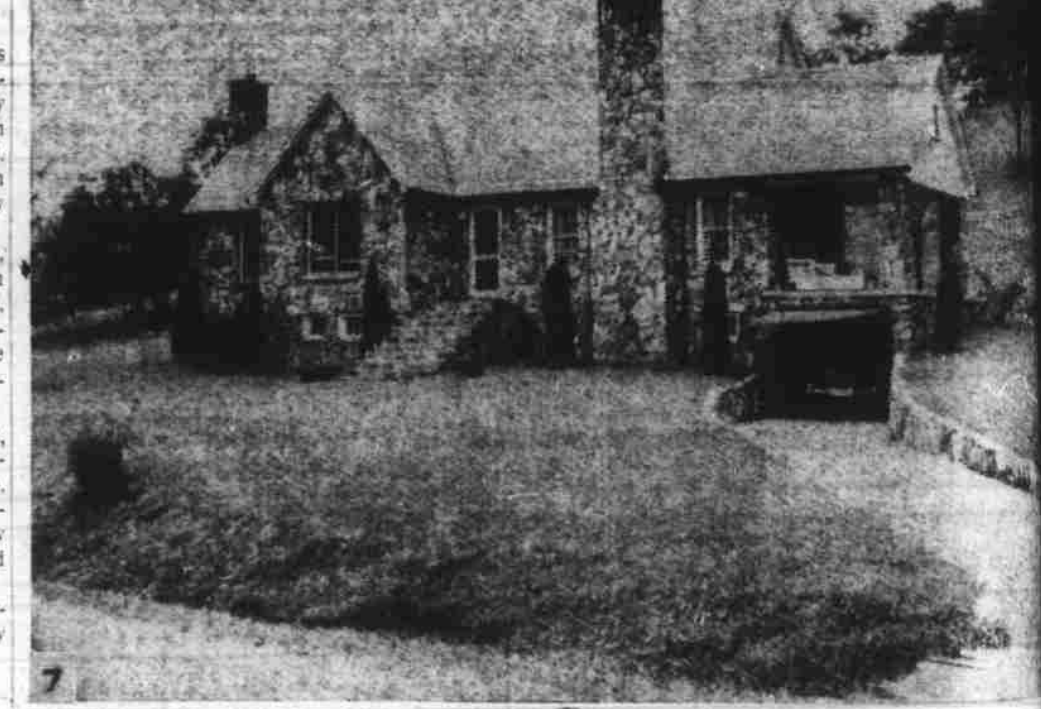
